**POSTOFFICE NEWS**

The Central Point post office is making plans to handle the largest volume of Christmas mail on record this year.

Postmaster William Abbott states that the volume of mail handled already this month is greater than for the same period last year which points to the fact that many people are mailing Christmas gifts earlier this year.

The postmaster advises patrons to mail parcels going to distant places not later than December 1 and parcels for points near here by Dec. 15.

Mr. Abbott pointed out that by mailing parcels early the post office is able to handle the outgoing mail before the large volume of incoming mail for Christmas begins arriving, which is about Dec. 15.

Postal clerks have been instructed to refuse to accept parcels which are not properly packed to be transported in the mails.

Patrons must realize that due to the large amount of mail in transit during this period parcels must be properly packed and wrapped and must be tied with strong cord in order to be safely transported in the mails.

Articles listed as unmailable anytime are intoxicating beverages, ammunition and explosives, inflammable matter such as matches, firearms which can be concealed on the person, poisons, obscene matter and narcotics. This is only a partial list of unmailable matter but covers the most important. The postal laws provide severe penalties for mailing such matter.

Patrons who are in doubt about any matter to be mailed or about anything concerning postal regulations should inquire at the post office.

**Blue Cross Campaign For Grangers Ends**

During the month of October, Oregon Granges concluded a campaign for enrollment in Blue Cross Plan for prepaid hospital care, adding 865 grangers and family members to the 6,000 already protected by Blue Cross, according to Frank E. Dickson, executive director, North-

west Hospital Service.

"The campaign planned by Blue Cross officials in cooperation with State Grange Master Morton Tompkins and the State Executive Committee, was carried on entirely by grangers," said Dickson.

Of the new members 279 are men, 308 women, and 278 children. Strawberry Grange, Number 661, under

the leadership of Jane Thomas, lecturer, was the first grange to over-subscribe their quota, signing up 66% the day the campaign was announced, July 1.

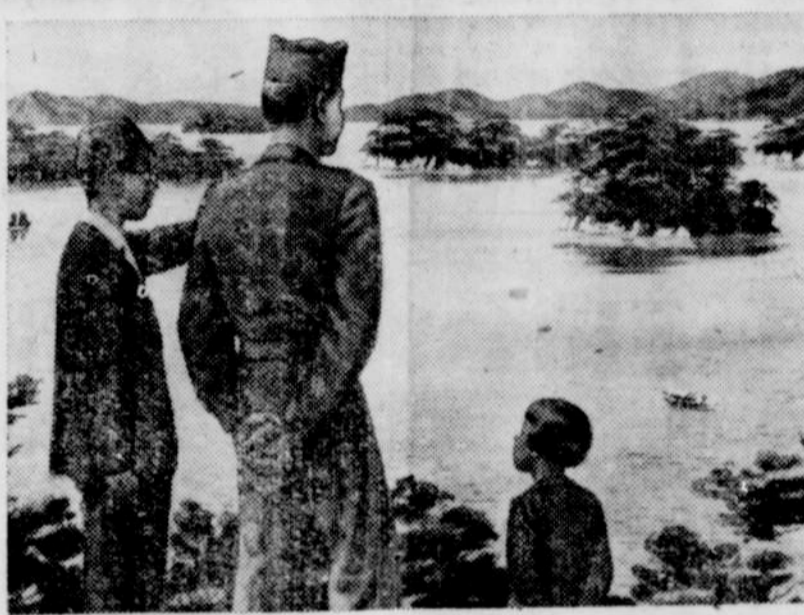
