

Central Point Wins Final Football Game

Central Point, playing their last football game of the 46' season, won a close fighting game with Talent, played on the Talent field, Friday, Nov. 15, at 2:30.

Central Point kicked-off to the Talent Bulldogs; since the kick landed in the end zone, the ball was brought out to the fifteen yard line. The Bulldogs gained a first down by the punt, but were stopped by the pointer line and were forced to kick, and Central Point took over. The Pointers made one first down and were also forced to punt. Colley's punt landed out of bounds on the Bull dog eighteen yard line, from where they were held on downs. Central Point again took over, and after a series of plays Fortune crossed the goal line for the first score of the game. Colley's dropkick was good for two points and the score stood 8-0 for the Pointers.

The Talent Bulldogs came right back and scored on a sustained drive, but failed to convert. The score then remained 8-6, in favor of the Pointers. Talent kicked to the Pointers, and Fortune took the ball on his own fifteen yard line, behind some magnificent blocking ran sixty eight yards for the second Pointer score. Central Point missed the conversion and the score was 14-6 with the Pointers on the long end.

The Pointers held Talent on downs and Milhoan was again forced to punt the Bulldogs out of danger. The kick was a low wobbly one and was taken on the Talent forty yard line and returned to the thirty by Ewald, the Pointer quarterback. The Pointers lost the ball on downs and were unable to hold the Bulldogs, who with another sustained drive by passes went into the end zone and also converted to make the score 14-13 for the Pointers at the end of the first half.

Talent kicked off to the Pointers, who took the ball on their own eight yard line, and returned it to the twenty five. The third quarter was nip and tuck all the way through, with neither the Pointers nor the Bulldogs able to score, and the quarter ended with Talent in possession of the ball.

Talent was held on downs and forced to punt, and the ball came to a stop on the Pointer thirty yard line. After making one first down the Pointers were held by the Bulldogs and forced to punt. Talent started a passing attack, and a pass from Williams to Dorman was good for six points. The Bulldogs made the conversion and the score remained 20-14 with Talent out in front for

the first time of the ball game.

With five minutes left to play, the Pointers dug in and scored twice before the Bulldogs could stop them. The first score was on a long down field drive that ended as the Pointers scored. The second touchdown was again set up by the driving backs of the Central Point team. A pass from Fortune to Hamiltca from the five yard line put the Pointers out in front with the score standing 26-30 as the game ended.

Dean Pieper to Head Ass'n Advertising

Expansion of 1947 operational plans plus the immediate re-establishment of a full time press and advertising department, have been announced in southern Oregon by the Shasta Cascade Wonderland Association.

President Arthur H. Fickett said that the department would be headed by Dean Pieper, an ex-southern Oregon newspaperman and formerly manager of the Ashland Chamber of Commerce. Functions will be two fold: providing newspapers and other media within the Association's area with general news release and feature material; and publicizing the region as a whole, on a general basis.

Pieper, who left as manager of a southern California Chamber of Commerce last year to enter military service, recently returned from overseas assignment. He was managing editor of the Army's Pacific Stars and Stripes in Tokyo and returned to the states in September.

With the revival of tourist promotion and travel, President Fickett

said that the Wonderland Association would make definite efforts to increase both highway development and transportation facilities in southern Oregon during the coming months. Initial activities along these lines were launched this year and will be greatly increased during the months to come.

"So, we have taken your claims and promises. You asked us 'Had Enough?' and we answered 'Yes.' We've accepted your word that 'it was time for a change!'

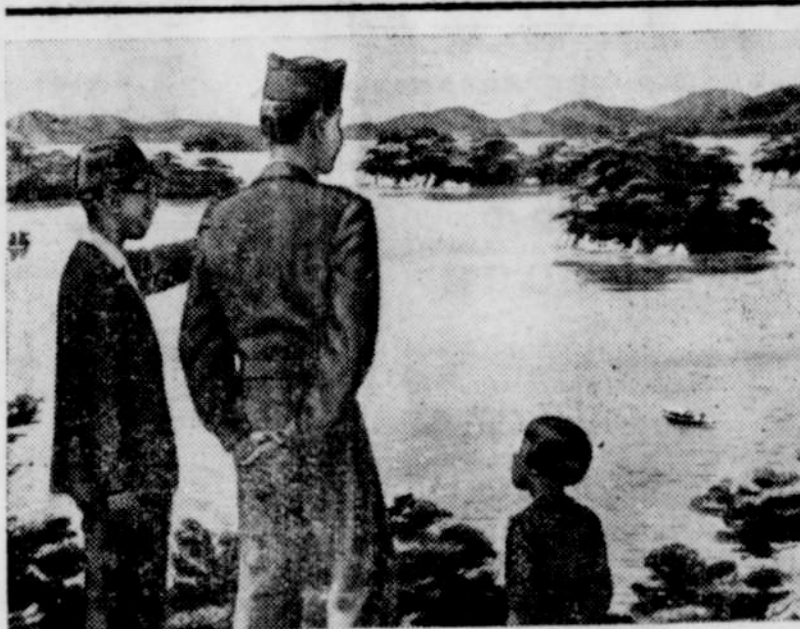
