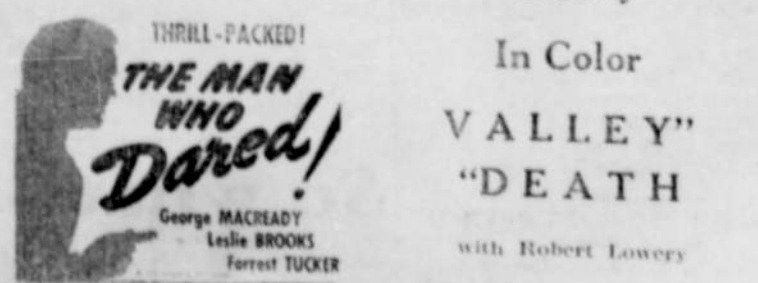

Bob Frink's accurate eye for the hoop and final moment stalling tactics paced by the big forward earned the Ashland high Grizzlies a 26-23 maple-court decision over Central Point at Ashland Tuesday night.

The Ashland triumph placed the two quint in a tie for the cellar post in the Southern Oregon conference. Each has won two tilts in nine games.

The contest was rough and fast all the way with the Pointers playing their scrappiest game of the season. Had they found better luck at hitting the hemp, the outcome of the tussle might have been different. Central Point outscored the Grizzlies seven to one in the final frame but it was too late for the spurt to mar the Ashland advantage. The victors had the upper hand 25-16 at the third period buzzer.

Don Ellsworth dropped in a bucket late in the first canto to make it 5-3 for the home five and give them a permanent lead. Halftime score was 15-11.

Frink netted 15 for the evening high and Lester Hansen got eight for Central Point. Ashland's jayvees ran over the Central Point reserves 46-16 in the opener.

Orean 4-H Clubs
Lead Entire Nation

Orean 4-H club leaders associations are so much farther advanced than those in most states that the rest of the nation is looking to this state as a pattern in building their own local leader groups.

This is the report given to the thirteenth annual 4-H club leaders conference at Oregon State college by Mrs. Charles L. Edwards of Benton county who was one of two Oregon local leaders to be awarded free trips to the national club congress in Chicago last fall.

Mrs. Edwards interviewed leaders

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from other states at the congress to pick up new ideas for use in Oregon. She found that the Oregon State local leaders association is considered the outstanding one in the country.

This three-day western Oregon conference will be followed by one for eastern Oregon at Pendleton February 13, 14 and 15. The Corvallis meeting was attended by 165 local club leaders from 20 western and central Oregon counties.

An evening banquet was addressed by E. H. Greenwood, secretary of the Oregon Bankers association, who said that while Oregon is sixth from the top nationally in percentage of eligible youth enrolled in club work, still only one in five is a member here, leaving a wide field for future work.

Mrs. E. F. Wright, Portland, is president of the state association

which directed portions of the program. Members of the O.S.C. staff conducted classes for leaders covering both objectives and methods in club work for 1947.

Leadership pins were presented at the banquet to the following:

Ten year—Alice Lindsay, Wilder, Josephine county; Mrs. Myrtle M. Schreiver, Mollala, Clackamas county; and Clayton Nyberg, Tualatin, Washington county. Nyberg was a formerly a club member for 10 years.

Five year—Mrs. W. E. Davis, Eagle Point, Jackson; Don Hagg, Reedville, Douglas; and Miss Maxine Wright, Days Creek, Douglas. Miss Wright, now an O.S.C. student, was 1945 state winner in canning. Hagg led the winning demonstration team in interstate competition for the O. M. Plummer trophy at the 1945 P.I.

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
