Pointes in Cellar In League Games

By losing to Ashland, Tuesday, Feb. 4th and Friday, Feb. 7th, Central Point landed in the cellar of the Conference. Both games were hard fought battles between the two teams. With the deadly accuracy of Bob Frink, who burned the twine for 36 points in the two games, these games were won by narrow margins of not more than 5 points.

The Pointers got off to a slow start in the game at Ashland and were trailing 7 to 3 at the end of the first quarter. No particular person was hitting the first quarter, but in the

second quarter, Bob Frink started his long hawitzer shots, missing most of these he followed the ball in to sink lay-ins. He scored eight out of eleven points that quarter. Central Point gathered eight points that period; 4 by Hansen; 3 by Rupp, and 1 by West. The first half ended 18 to 11 for Ashland.

The second half started very much like the first but it ended very much to the contrary. Frink scored 6 and Mitchell 1 for 7 points that quarter. Central Point gathered 5 points for the quarter leaving the score 25 to 16 at the end of the 3rd quarter. In the last quarter it was a different story. Brown got 3, Hansen 3, and Rupp countered 1 to fall short for while we were getting 7 points, Ashland was rining up 1 point. And the game ended 26-23 in Ashland's favor.

In Friday's game it was the same story. Frink burning the hemp from any where on the maple in this game alone he made 21 points.

As the game started Colley was fouled and he sank the gift toss to make the first point of the game. Hansen got one from the field. Hansen was fouled, made the point, Rupp caught one from the field. Frink sank a basket, and then sinks 3 out of 4 foul shots. Wade scores just as the quarter ends, 7-6 in Ashland's favor.

The second quarter opened with Ashland starting the scoring with Frink making a charity toss and a field goal, and Wade dumped in a basket. For Central Point, Colley

The third quarter opened with a long shot from the center by Colley for D. C. Frink retaliated for Ashland with a goal from the field, and then it was Colley, Frink, and Brown with baskets before the quarter ended 27-24 for Ashland.

The fourth quarter was a wild

Frink collected two free throws and Colley and West one each to keep the game tied. Frink and Carlson got goals to up the Grizzlies out in front. The game ended 38-33 for the Ashland Grizzlies.

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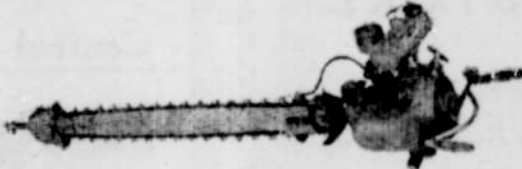
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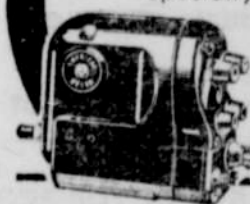
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
