Vern Smith to Represent Southwest Paralysis Chapter

Formation of an Oregon State Planning commission to coordinate the activities of all Infantile Paralysis chapters of the state was reported here Tuesday by Vern Smith, chairman of the Jackson County Chapter for Infantile Paralysis. Mr. Smith attended the organization meeting in Portland Saturday.

Elected to serve on the committee

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were two representatives from each congressional district in Oregon. The fourth district, including Coos, Curry, Douglas, Jackson, Josephine, Lane and Linn counties will be represented by Mr. Smith of Jackson county and Elton A. Schroeder of Myrtle Point, chairman of the Coos county chapter, as result of the balloting.

Officers elected to head the new committee were: Mrs. F. W. Blum, secretary of the Multnomah chapter, chairman; Roy Houek, Marion county chairman, as vice-chairman; Dr. V. C. Staats, chairman of the Yamhill chapter, second vice-chairman; Mrs. J. P. Arnold, Deschutes county chairman, secretary.

Formation of the state coordinating committee is a pioneer step, Mr. Smith stated. The Oregon committee is the first to be organized in the nation. It has, however, been approved as a forward step by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. The keynote and purpose of the state committee will be "preparedness." In the event of an epidemic in any section of the state, the chapter representatives expressed the belief such a committee would speed the conquering program by making all facilities of the state more readily available.

The committee will meet in some

section of the state every three months. In this manner, Mr. Smith pointed out, all members will be in constant touch with the state and national programs and will be given timely information regarding activities and available facilities in each county of the state. Each county's problems will be brought before the state committee and full-state co-operation will be offered in the solution.

The nation is undergoing its fifth consecutive year of severe infantile paralysis epidemics, the National Foundation has revealed. The U.S. Public Health Service figures indicate the nation may be in for one of the worst outbreaks of polio ever recorded. That is why, Mr. Smith stated, that Oregon is taking this early action to be prepared for what all workers hope will not happen here.

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
