School Cooks Learn Use Gov't Surplus

Oregon school lunch cooks are learning the ins and outs of preparing government surplus dried eggs and dried orange juice with the help of Miss Lucy Case, extension nutritionist at Oregon State college.

These surplus products are available only to public institutions, such as the school lunch program, and not to the general public under the USDA price support program.

One training school for 43 school lunch cooks was held by Miss Case in October at the Colin Kelly school near Eugene as part of a tri-county teachers institute for Linn, Lane and Benton counties.

The use of dried eggs in spoon bread, baked rarebit, chocolate bread pudding, baked custard and scrambled eggs was demonstrated by Miss Case. Those who sampled the finished products especially liked the scrambled eggs cooked in a double boiler and seasoned with fried wien-

ers, celery and onion.

Both dried eggs and dried orange juice must be reconstituted by putting back the amount of water removed in drying. Miss Case showed. When dried eggs have been refreshed with water they will keep no longer than fresh eggs removed from their shell.

School cooks are using dried orange juice with plain gelatin for salads, in sauces for cottage pudding, in baked custard and Harvest beets. After the dried orange juice is mixed with water it is poured back and forth from one pitcher to another to add air to aerate it.

Will You Be A Statistic?

It is said, if you wish to enjoy the future, you must heed the past. It is another way of pointing out that experience is the best teacher.

We have just read some appalling statistics on street and highway accidents in; 946 from the Travelers Insurance companies. If experience is the best teacher, these grim facts out of the immediate past are a precious lesson for all of us.

Two out of every three automobile accidents in the United States last year involved careless driving. Exceeding the speed limit took the heaviest toll—9,460 killed and 230,760 injured; 10,070 pedestrians were killed, and 171,910 injured in 1946. Crossing between intersections was the most frequent cause of death and injury, accounting for more than 25% of the casualties. There were 870 children killed and 21,660 injured last year while they were playing on the streets.

The vast majority of accidents last year—and any year—were caused by more or less experienced motorists who had at least one year of driving experience.

Counties Authorized to Build Memorial Halls

The county courts of Oregon are authorized by 1947 law to help finance the construction of war veterans' memorial buildings, the Department of Veterans' Affairs pointed out

this week to servicemen's groups interested in the construction of meeting places.

Chapter 595, Oregon Laws 1947, states in part: "Upon the application of any two or more federally recognized veterans' organizations, the county courts of the state hereby are authorized and empowered to pay out of county funds such amounts as the courts may deem to be necessary or advisable to assist in the construction or acquisition of buildings to be used as club rooms and meeting places for service and ex-service veterans of any war."

Limit of amounts the counties may give are: in counties of from 1000 to 5000 population, \$5000; 5000 to 10,000 population, \$10,000; 10,000 to 20,000 population \$15,000; 20,000 to 100,000 population, \$25,000; and more than 100,000 population, \$50,000.

The law says veteran organizations must apply to the county courts by July, 1948, and it prohibits county financial aid for more than one such veterans' memorial building in any one city.
