Faculty-Alumni Mix Sets Pace at O.S.C.

University of Oregon, Eugene, November 13 (Special)—A faculty-alumni mix on Friday night, November 21, preceeding the traditional Oregon-Oregon State football game will set the pace for the University's thirty-first annual Homecoming.

Plans for the 1947 Homecoming will put particular emphasis on alumni participation, according to student chairman Morven Thomas, Portland. Saturday night programs are being planned by all living organizations for the special entertainment of alums. Housing for visiting alums is a special project of the weekend, Thomas said. A list of private rooms is being compiled by the committee. Alums interested in housing are asked to write to the Homecoming housing committee, care of the Alumni Office, Friendly Hall, campus.

Fur Trapping Season Set by Commission

Trapping season for mink, muskrat, otter and raccoon opens November 15, it is announced by the Oregon

State Game Commission, and will extend to February 15. There will be no open season on marten, fisher, beaver and ringtail cats.

Trapping license fee is \$3 and

trappers are required to mark their traps with a brand registered with the Commission. Landowners, who are not required to buy a license, must, however, register the location

of their land with the Commission each season they trap. All persons are required to file within 30 days after the close of the season a report on the number of animals taken.

State refuges will be open to the trapping of furbearing animals with the exception of the following which remain closed: Summer Lake Management Area, Lake Oswego game refuge, Sturgeon Lake game refuge, Whitetail Deer refuge and all city and municipal watersheds now in refuges.

The last legislature passed a law abolishing the sale of trapping licenses to nonresidents.
