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More Prizes March of Dimes Contest

Prizes are still coming in to increase the number to be offered winners in the March of Dimes contest now being sponsored in Jackson county to raise funds to fight infantile paralysis. Matt Freed, Medford chairman of the annual drive, reported today. The awards have reached the \$1000 mark and more are promised by valley merchants and business houses. There will be just 10 grand winners, Mr. Freed stated, but many, many more than 10 prizes.

The prizes will go to the 10 people, writing the best letters on "Why We Should Support the March of Dimes." Each letter must be accompanied by a contribution to the March of Dimes.

The contest opened last Saturday night, when Mr. Freed addressed the

public from radio station KMED and entries immediately began flowing in from various sections of the county. Contestants were urged yesterday by Mr. Freed to limit their letters to 25 words or less. They must be mailed to P.O. Box 300, Medford. Contestants may send in as many letters as they wish, but each letter must be accompanied by a contribution to the March of Dimes. Checks may be made payable to Jackson County Chapter National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis or to Ralph Sweeney treasurer for the annual March of Dimes.

Letters will be judged by Mrs. Darrell Fuson and her committee and prizes will be awarded at the annual Elks' club President's ball on Jan. 31.

Further information regarding the contest will be given every Saturday night in a special program on station KMED from 6 to 6:15.
