U. of O. DEBATE TEAM DISCUSSES PROBLEM

Three students from University of Oregon, composing a symposium team, presented an assembly program Wednesday, February 11, first period, speaking on the subject of World Peace.

Cecil Warner introduced their instructor, who accompanied them on the tour, and he in turn introduced the first speaker, who outlined the subject of the debate. He mentioned a few facts on the starving nations of the world, some startling results of the Atomic bomb explosions and offered a little background for the discussion of the U. N.

Wally Mead, second speaker, denoted a World Government, which would be on the same basis as the 48 United States, and explained how it might work if enough obstacles could be removed.

The third speaker considered the World Government an impossibility because of the conflict between the two major countries of the world and favored strengthening the U. N. by settling the much smaller differences with which it is faced.

A discussion followed, and questions from the student body were argued by members of the symposium team.
