Central Point celebrates tenth birthday.

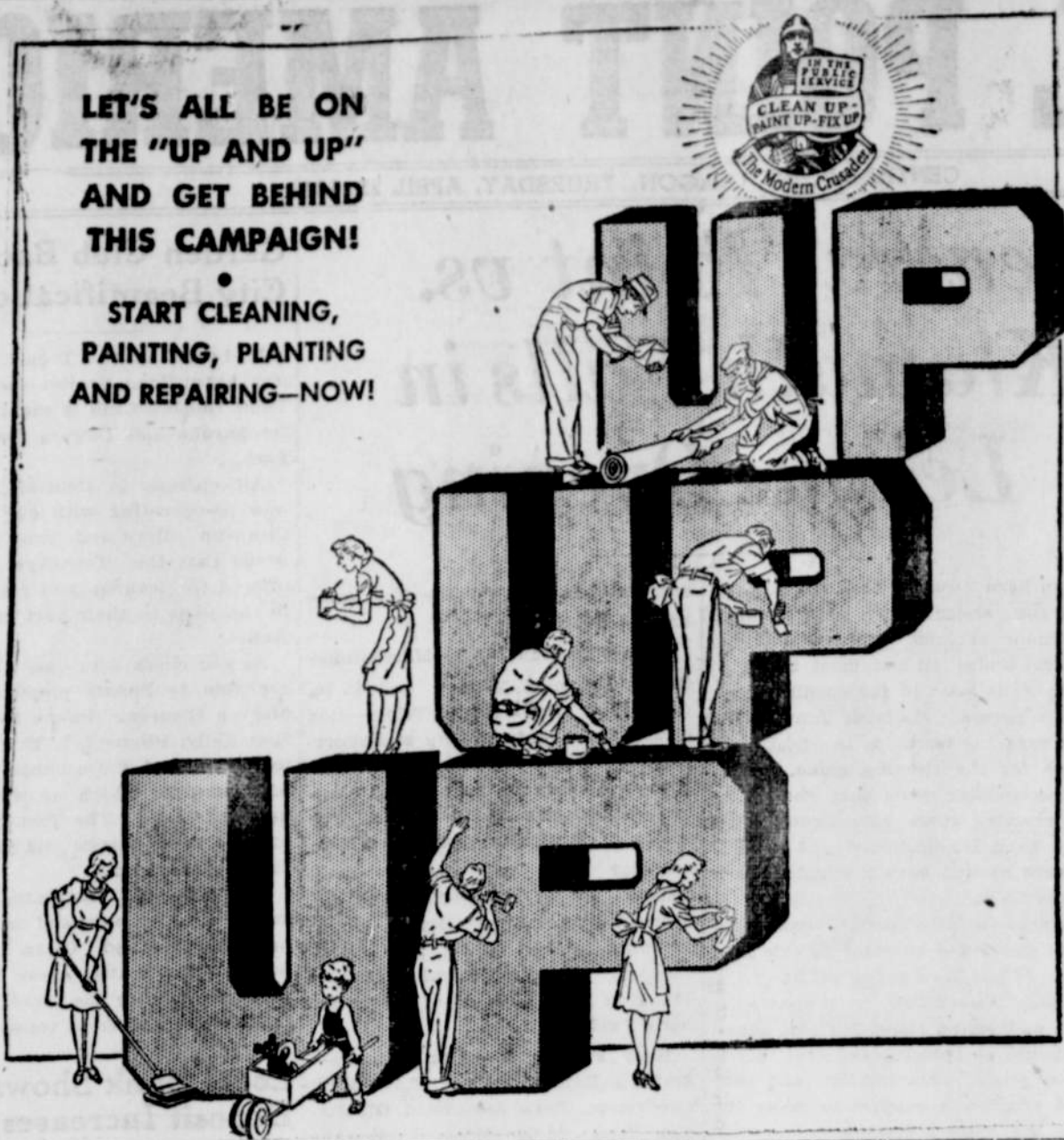
New service station on corner of Front and Pine streets nears completion. New station under personal supervision of Vern Pendleton and Don Patterson.

No candidates listed from Central Point in races for county offices.

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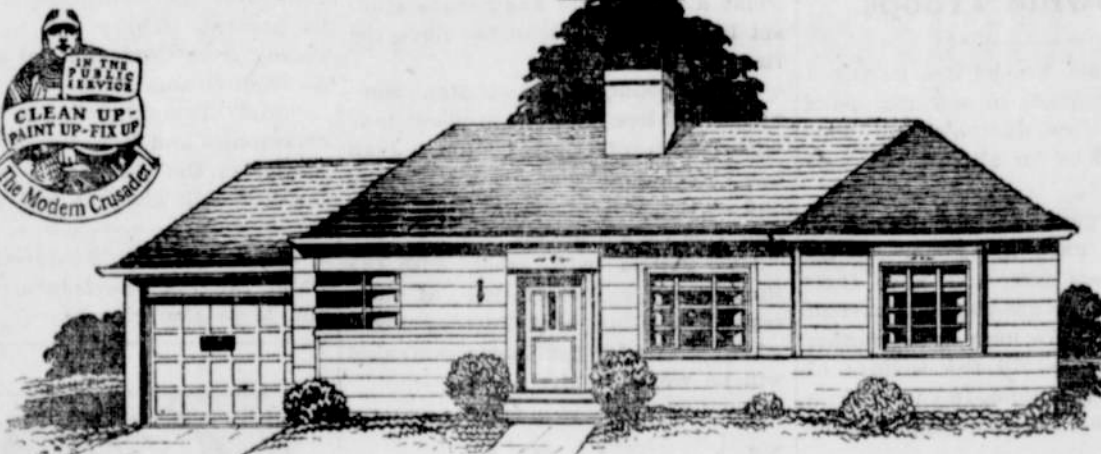
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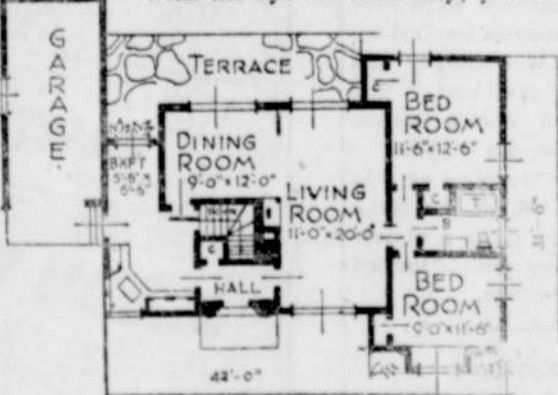
