6 Valley Residents Win Pepsi-Cola Prizes

Six Southern Oregon residents have been announced as winners of State prizes in the third month's contest of a series of six monthly Treasurer Top Contests being run by the Pepsi-Cola Company throughout the country.

Each month the Pepsi-Cola Company is awarding 2650 separate State and National prizes in the contest, totaling \$26,500; the prizes include each month, in each state, 51 cash State prizes to consumers and 3 cash State prizes to dealers. Alaska, Too Has Freak Winter Weather

April was a humdinger of a month so far as breaking records is concerned, according to the U.S. Weather Bureau report of William B. Lindley, in charge of the Fairbanks branch. New records set were:

Eight times the normal amount of precipitation for April, or 2.30 inches. The past record was .98 in April 1918.

The greatest snowfall on record for April, at 25.1 inches, and the greatest in any month since January 1941 when 27.1 inches fell.

The greatest snow depth (on April 6) ever on the ground in April since 1930 when this record was begun. This was 33.6 inches.

The coldest April since 1927, the mean temperature for the month being 23.2 or 6 degrees below normal. The coldest April on record was in 1924 when the mean was 14.8.

The highest average wind recorded for any month since wind records were begun in 1930. This was 10.1 miles per hour, compared with the previous record of 8.1 in May of 1945 and 1947.—From Jessons Weekly, Fairbanks, Alaska, May 7th, 1948.
