Plan Music Festival At Hood River

HOOD RIVER, Ore.—The Hood River music festival, August 5 to 8 will be directed by Boris Sirpo, Portland symphony conductor, whose idea it was to make the apple

city become an American Salzburg each year.

Five concerts are scheduled, four of which Sirpo will conduct. In five years of work at Hood River, Sirpo has built choruses and symphony orchestras which have gained national recognition.

The Alma Trio will open the festival, Thursday, August 5 at 8:30 P.M. Adolph Baller is the pianist; Roman Totenberg, violinist; and Gabor Rejto, cellist.

Friday evening, August 6, the Portland Chamber orchestra will present a program featuring soprano Marina Koshetz, Boston

symphony soloist, screen and radio star. Saturday evening the deeply significant symphonic psalm "King David" is offered with a cast of 600. Saturday afternoon the Hood River junior symphony and chorus will be presented.

The final concert, Sunday evening, features Ezio Pinza, foremost operatic basso of this era, who will sing two groups of arias with the Hood River symphony orchestra. The program will be climaxed by presentation of "Finlandia" by Si-bellius, in a special arrangement using a chorus.

The festival will be held outdoors

in an "alpine" setting. Reservations, tickets and information may be secured from festival headquarters, Box 35, Hood River.

Oregon historians say California's big gold rush in 1849 was caused by the gold discovery at Colma in 1848 by two Oregonians, Charles Bennett and James Marshall, who went south from Oregon to help build Captain Sutter's historic mill.
