Multnomah College Opens 52nd Year

MUTNOMAH COLLEGE, Portland, Ore., (Special)—Multnomah College opens its 52nd year on September 1 when registration for the fall semester begins. Registration for the technical schools will begin on this date and classes in the refrigeration, aviation, and auto schools will start Sept. 7. Radio classes start on Sept. 13. Registration for all schools will be held at the downtown college, southwest Sixth and Yamhill, according to Dr. Edward L. Clark, president.

The largest shops in the history of the college will be in operation for the fall semester. The Swan Island division, housing the aviation, radio, and refrigeration schools, has over 40,000 square feet of floor space devoted to classrooms, laboratories and shops.

A \$12,000 Magnaflux parts inspection unit has been added to the aviation shops. This unit is one of few such installations in school shops in the country. Using principles of magnetism and infra-red light, the equipment is designed to show defects not visible to the eye.

A complete new commercial refrigeration shop, including two walk-in refrigerators, has been built during the summer. Reverse cycle heating and air condition installations are also included in the laboratory.

Radar equipment has been installed in the radio shops for the use of advanced students.

New milling machines have been added to the uptown automotive school. The addition of these machines makes the shop one of the most complete in the Northwest.

Over 40 Research Project Listed

More than 40 research projects on the utilization of Oregon forest products are either under way or in the planning stage by the Oregon forest products laboratory at Oregon State college, according to an information circular just issued by the lab.

Written by William J. Baker, chief of the industrial service section of the laboratory, the bulletin is intended to acquaint those interested with the research program, the services offered, authorization, need for the program and other matters related to its operation.

Since the major objective of the lab's program is to obtain complete utilization of the forest crop, the author points out, it is the policy of the advisory committee and the laboratory to cooperate fully with

individuals, and public agencies in effort to attain that objective.

Subject only to the limitations of laboratory personnel and available data, a resident of Oregon may, without charge, obtain advice, information and assistance on any forest products utilization problem. The circular says. Moreover, the lab will welcome suggestions for research projects.

The current scope of the lab's research program is indicated by some of the projects outlined in the circular. These include research in various phases of wood chemistry, wood carbonization, wood preservation, timber testing, wood utilization, sawmill surveys and several miscellaneous projects.

Paul M. Dunn, dean of forestry at Oregon State college, is director of the laboratory which was established by legislative action in 1941. It is associated with the state board of forestry and the O.S.C. school of forestry. The advisory committee composed of members from representative interests at present consists of Governor John H. Hall, chairman; N. S. Rogers, state forester; secretary; H. J. Cox, West Coast Lumberman's association; Charles W. Fox, Oregon plywood interests; J. Alfred Hall, Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment station; Orville R. Miller, Willamette Valley Lumberman's association; Carl A. Rasmussen, Western Pine association; and Western Pine association; and Dean Dunn.

Combine To Be Given As Prize

A new "model 60" all-crop combine harvester with auxiliary motor, will go as sweepstake award to the grower entering the best sack of malting barley in the Pacific Northwest Barley Contest at the Pacific International Livestock Exposition, October 1 to 9. This farm equipment is in addition to the \$2000 in cash awards offered by the Great Western Malting Company in co-operation with the Brewers' Institutes of Oregon and Washington to encourage the production of high quality malting barley, with its premium market prices.

Among the other new prizes, not listed in the catalog for exhibitors, is a ten-year challenge plaque from Swift and Co. of Portland for the college team winning the animal husbandry livestock judging contest. Gold medals will also go to individual winners in the judging. The plaque will become the permanent property of the college winning it most frequently during the ten year period.

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
