RAMBLING NOTES

Sept. 29

Well, this is Paris (not Paris, France), Tenn. We crossed the Mississippi river at Memphis, Tenn. and traveled through the Ozark Mountains that we would turn hills in Oregon. Stayed at Van Burn

Sunday night. This is Arkansas. Not much to see.

Today drove to El Reno for the night. All you see is hills and more hills. There is some good farms west of Oklahoma City which was a change from the hills and negro shacks. There are quite a few oil wells near Oklahoma City. Crossed the pan handle of Texas Tuesday. Why they ever took this country from the Indians, I cannot see. Saw some of the lowest tribe of Indians still living in stone huts about 12 feet across and 8 feet high built round, pretty crowded for a family of six or more.

Well, here is a more pleasant picture the painted desert which is very pretty. Next the petrified forest. Saw logs from 6 inches to 6 feet across and 6 to 8 ft. long.

Here we are at Grand Canyon. This is the most beautiful scenery of the trip. Cannot be described. All colors of the rainbow and all different shapes of formation every direction one looks at it the color is different.

Next stop Hoover Dam (Bolder dam) this is about the tops in feat of engineering. You go down in the elevator some 865 feet. Go through miles of tunnel which was used to divert the river while they built the dam about 6 years. After the tour you come up in another elevator. The fact is you went down in Nevada and came up in Arizona. The river is backed up about 115 miles. They have 6 large generators on one side of the dam and 5 on other room for 3 more. Only takes 1 year and costs \$3,000,000 to make one generator.

Next stop Zion National Park, the most beautiful drive of the trip 7 miles of grand view changing colors and shape of formation. Next to Brice canyon which is nice but after Garnd canyon and Zion Park looks small but has the same general formation.

Salt Lake City. Visited the state house which is very beautiful and they have the best museum in it that we saw.

Visited temple Square but did not stay to hear the pipe organ.

Next and last stop Reno. There is more money changes hands in Reno in 24 hours than in Central Point in 30 days. It is nice to see the crowds in the gambling halls but gets tiresome. They are so crowded you can hardly get through.

Visited Lassen park, sure looked good to see the large green timber. Visited Shasta dam, small by side of Bolder.
