Mrs. Gentner chose as her subject "Selection of Fall Bulbs". A number of colored illustrations helped to emphasize the beauty of the flowers produced by the many bulbs which can be planted in the fall for spring blooming. New and interesting bulbs were suggested from the old standbys tulips and daffodils. It was suggested that the wild bulbs can be obtained from companies that are specializing in the wild flowers thus saving the uncertainty of digging and spoiling the natives which may be fast disappearing. Mrs. Gentner presented each member with a packet of anemone seed from her own garden, urging members to try planting some now and some in the spring.

The hostess served refreshments with a lovely arrangement of lavender fall flowers as the center of interest. A peace rose was also of interest which Mrs. Daniel Stewart had grown.

Gold Hill Team Loses to Talent

Talent, Oct. 1—Rallying for 18 points in the second half, the Talent high football team stopped Gold Hill high 24 to 6 on the local field last night under the floodlights. It was Talent's second victory for the season and the second loss for the visiting Gold Hill sextet.

The Beavers of Gold Hill in this Jackson county "class B" league game got the jump on the home team by scoring early in the first quarter after intercepting a pass. Gene Holderness went over from the 5 yard line but the point try failed.

Talent tallied on a "basketball" play in the second quarter to tie up the game at 6 to 6. The Bulldogs recovered a fumble on the Gold Hill 3 and on the second play a pass by Don Millage was batted around in the Beavers backfield a bit before Joe Fenton grabbed the

ball for a score. A dropkick for the extra point failed.

Jerry Montgomery garnered the first Talent touchdown in the third quarter as he dove over center from the 1-foot line after the Bulldogs had intercepted a pass. Again the Point try failed. Don Millage had taken the Gold Hill pass deep in Talent territory and returned it to the Gold Hill 1-foot mark before being forced out of bounds.

Millage returned a punt from the Talent 30 to the Gold Hill 5-yard mark by reversing the field after being stopped on one side. After a penalty to the 10, Montgomery passed to Nick Nichols for a touchdown on the next play. A dropkick for the extra point was wide.

Talent's final tally came late in the fourth quarter when a short Gold Hill punt touched a Talent man huddled with several other Talent and Gold Hill men back of the line of scrimmage. Bob Goddard picked up the loose pigskin in the open and had a clear field for a touchdown. Again the extra point try failed.
