92 Million Dollars Revenue Brought by Tourists to State

SALEM, ORE., Oct. 21 (Special)—Oregon's 1948 tourist business brought estimated revenues of 92 million dollars into the beaver state, the Oregon state highway commission travel information department reported this week.

This figure, 12 per cent below the 1947 estimate of 105 million dollars, is 10 per cent above the 83 1/2 million figure of 1946. The last pre-war travel year of 1941 is credited with a total of 51 million dollars.

The survey reveals the average expenditure per day person was \$5.35 as compared to \$5.91 in 1947, which, itself, showed a drop from the 1946 figure of \$6.21.

7.1 days in Oregon, or equalling \$37.99 per person. These figures represent motorists who used campgrounds exclusively as well as those who patronized hotels, auto courts and resorts entirely, offering a thorough cross-section of Oregon vacation travel.

Approximately 600,000 out-of-state automobiles visited Oregon during the year, with average mileage of 663 for each, officials said. Oregon attracted visitors from

every state in the union, with California leading motor travel by 51 per cent because of its proximity and large population. The states of Washington and Illinois were second and third, followed by Nebraska, Idaho, Iowa and Kansas.

High cost of living and tightening of purse strings are declared pertinent factors in the reduction of individual spending, which reportedly was down in other vacation areas in the nation, indicating a downward trend in general tourist spending.

Early season travel volume was affected last June by the Columbia river flood, which was reflected by a 29.1 per cent out-of-state decline for that month. Late season vacations were somewhat affected by strike inspired September gasoline shortages.

The 1948-49 advertising campaign to encourage Oregon vacation travel interest will be underway in November in national magazines and newspapers, extolling scenic attractions to encourage a busy 1949 travel year.
