Notice of School Election Upon Question of Increasing Tax Levy Over Amount Limited by Section 11, Article XI, State Constitution
 Notice is hereby given that an election will be held in School District No. 6 of Jackson County, State of Oregon, at the high school building in said district for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said district the question of increasing the tax levy for the year 1949-1950 over the amount limited by section 11, article XI, of the Constitution of Oregon.
 The reasons for increasing such levy are:
 Under the Rural School Law the local district has no base therefore all amounts levied exceed the 6% limitation. The amount of tax, in excess of the 6% limitation, proposed to be levied for said year is \$101,045.00.
