

Leadership Problems Told at 4-H Meet

Leadership problems with teenage and younger children will be leaders conferences in eastern and eladers conferences in eastern and western Oregon, announces L. J. Allen state 4-H club leader.

Leaders from approximately 24 western Oregon counties will meet in the Oregon State college Memorial Union building January 25, 26 and 27. Judging from past attendance at this annual three-day conference Allen expects about 300 leaders to attend.

Meeting place for an expected 15 leaders representing 12 eastern Oregon counties has been set for Pendleton, February 1, 2 and 3, in the Vert Memorial building.

Mrs. E. F. Wright, Portland, president of the state 4-H local leaders association, will participate in both conferences, Allen states. Conference plans this year call for a minimum of formal speeches. The leaders will be divided into discussion groups based on their interest in either agriculture or home economics.

Special emphasis will be on leadership questions related to meeting and understanding youngsters. Miss Ruby Peregrine, Portland, will lead these discussions at both conferences. She is former director of youth activities for Westminster Presbyterian church, Portland, and is now on the staff of Lewis and Clark college, Portland.

Representatives of commercial companies as well as local leaders and state college staff members will assist in the programs for both conferences, Allen adds.

Ashland Wins Over Pointers, 49 to 34

Neither their basket-hitting nor their offensive floor game were up to pre-Christmas form. It was the second loss in a row for the Central Point crew which was bounced by Myrtle Creek earlier in the week.

Twenty-seven fouls were called against Ashland and 16 against Central Point in the Friday engagement. Ashlanders Carlson, Don Ellsworth and Phil Klingsheim were chased to the showers for too many fouls.

In the preliminary the Ashland ayves completely mastered Central Point's junior varsity 41 to 14.

Married Vets Say Better to Wait if Going to College

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Veteran married students on this campus, with children, are in general well satisfied with their combined student-family arrangement, but if they were advising engaged

couples of normal college age they would recommend waiting until after graduation for marriage.

Such is the predominant opinion found by Mrs. Florence Aller in a questionnaire study of 36 student veteran families, each of whom had one or more children. She used this study as the basis of a thesis on "Family Problems of a Limited Group of College Student Veterans Who are Parents," as part of her work for a master's degree in home economics.

Mrs. Aller, herself a mother and the wife of a veteran who is completing work here for a doctor's degree in botany, is now an instructor here in household administration.

Asked what would be their recommendation to engaged couples of normal college age, in contrast with the older returned veterans, 58 percent of the men and 51 percent of the women said they would

recommend finishing college before marriage. Almost exactly a third of both men and women said they would recommend marriage, with postponement of children until after graduation. They said this would only apply if the wife were reconciled to dropping out of college if the "no children" plan failed.

Only two of the men and four of the women went all the way and recommended marriage, with children, while in college.

Family finances, child care difficulties and housing were mentioned most often, in that order, as the chief problems of married students with children. All but two families said they had to supplement GI bill income either by working or by drawing on savings or both.

A large majority said children in the home made studying there more difficult but said they added incentive, which may account for the fact that statistics show that married veterans lead in grade averages as a group and that those with children average the highest among veterans.
