THIS PROPOSAL'S SLICK AS BUTTER

Three big dairy organizations are out with a proposal which strikes us as partly guile but mostly gall. They are the American Butter Institute, the National Creameries Association and the National Co-operative Milk Producers Federation. Here's what they propose:

If Congress will prohibit manufacture and sale of yellow-colored margarine they will support repeal of the quarter-cent a pound Federal tax on white margarine.

Aren't the butter boys getting big headed?

Present Federal laws don't outlaw yellow margarine. They do almost completely prevent its sale by taxing manufacturers 10 cents a pound and by requiring heavy license fees from wholesalers and retailers who deal in it.

So nearly all the millions of housewives who use margarine rather than pay the high price of butter, buy white margarine and have to do the messy, wasteful job of coloring it in their home kitchen.

Of course, the whole purpose of the margarine taxes and fees is to protect butter from a whole, palatable competitive product. There are other Federal laws to prevent or punish fraudulent sale of yellow margarine.

Now the butter boys want Congress to prohibit, absolutely, the manufacture and sale of yellow margarine. In return, they would consent to removal of the quarter-cent tax on white margarine. That tax, though a nuisance, is a relatively minor cost item. So butter would be giving up no vital part of its present unfair advantage. And the housewives wouldn't be getting any important gain.

The real purpose of the butter boys' proposal is to prevent Congress from completing a good job which it almost did last year.

Then the House passed, 269 to 106, a bill to repeal all Federal taxes and license fees on margarine, yellow or white. A Senate committee voted, 12 to 10, to approve that bill. The Senate would have passed it, if it had been brought to a vote there, but it was shelved in the adjourned rush.

This margarine bill has been revived in the present session of Congress now in session and should be pushed to final enactment. That is the only appropriate way to answer the butter boy's slick proposal.
