EDITORIALS

IT IS YOUR RED CROSS

For 67 years the American Red Cross has meant sympathy, com-

passion, and help in time of need to the people of the United States and of the world. During that span of time it has become a vital part of American life—a powerful symbol in this country of man's humanity to man, of his universal compulsion to aid the suffering and the distressed.

The Red Cross is not a thing apart, but an essential section of the fabric of America. It is as truly of and by and for the American people as our government itself.

The broad activities of the Red Cross—for disaster victims, on behalf of members of the armed forces and veterans, with the hospitalized—in teaching safety and health to hundreds of thousands of people—and through the Junior Red Cross—are dependent upon the volunteer efforts of the millions of men, women, and children who make up its membership.

Its ability to help, instantly and effectively, the family across the street, or across the nation, or across the sea, is founded in the broad network of Red Cross chapters which reaches into every community in the United States. And it exists only to serve, to do what you would do if you were on the scene.

In truth, the American Red Cross is your agent for the complicated task of meeting human need wherever it exists in this modern world. That is a heavy responsibility. Each individual American must bear his share of it.

Opening Domiciliary
Lightens Case Load

Opening of the new Veterans Administration domiciliary center at Medford recently is expected to relieve the patient load in VA hospitals in the Northwest by providing facilities to care for veterans whose disabilities do not require hospitalization or continuous medical treatment, the VA reports.

In general, only veterans suffering from chronic, permanent disabilities which prevent them from earning a living will be admitted for domiciliary care, the VA said. They must be able to care for their own ordinary physical needs and require only incidental medical attention.

The VA urges veterans not to apply for domiciliary care if their disabilities require hospitalization or continuous medical treatment because only enough infirmity beds will be maintained to treat domiciliary members. Emergency cases will be admitted for treatment, but will be moved as soon as feasible to a VA hospital where more complete medical facilities are available.

Examples of cases eligible for admittance to VA domiciliary homes are veterans suffering from heart trouble, arthritis, epilepsy, blindness and others. Not eligible for admittance are active cases of tuberculosis, cancer or veterans unable to feed themselves with at least one hand.

Due to the lateness of the hour, only routine business were transacted.

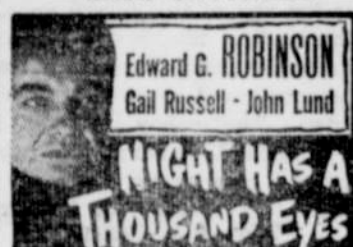

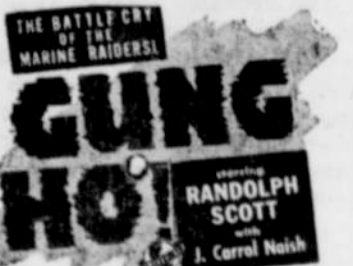

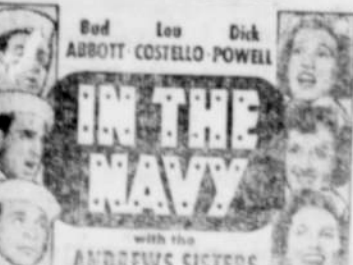
