Junior Kilburn, who has been sick with the measles, is back in school again.

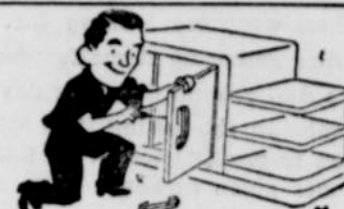
Miss Lucille Abbott of Medford spent Tuesday night with Miss Lysle Gregory.

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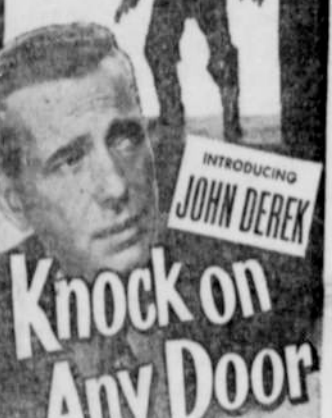
