

Missionaries to Be Heard Bible Church

French Indo-China, the Tibetan border, and the Congo, Africa will be represented at the Missionary Convention beginning Monday evening at the Community Bible Church.

Mrs. Helen Koenigswald, who has spent 12 years in the land of Tibet will speak on Monday and Tuesday evenings. She comes from the town of Labrong, where four thousand monks spend their lives in heathen prayer. The missionary says, "In Tibet women have not heard of their rights. They drudge among poverty, ignorance and hopelessness, just as they did in the days when Marco Polo astounded the world with his stories of this strange land."

Tales of missionary work in a bizarre land "on the roof of the world" where butter is used for fuel, food, cleansing agent and currency, where half of the population leads a monastic life and the other half a nomadic one as in the Biblical days of Abraham, where sorcerers weave black spells to the beating of drums made of human skulls, are told by Mrs. Koenigswald.

Rev. G. C. Ferry will speak Wednesday evening and the following Sunday. He has spent over 20 years in a land filled with disease, demon possession and opium smoking and his talks will give you an insight into missionary work that you have never had before.

Rev. H. R. Florence, Congo, Africa, who speaks on Thursday and Friday evenings, comes from a land where there are few new missionaries and millions of people yet to be evangelized. He has many curios and a native costume for display. Kodachrome pictures will be featured throughout the Convention.

On Monday evening the Simpson Bible Institute choir will give a sacred concert in connection with the Convention. The public is cordially invited. The meetings begin at 7:45 each evening with no service on Saturday night.

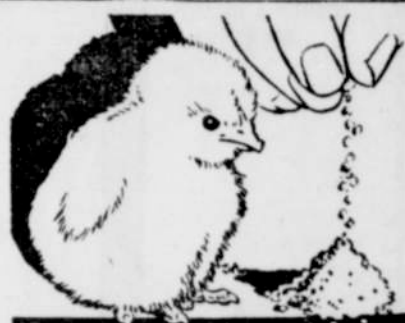
