

Athletic Association Meets at Smitty's

The Central Point Athletic Association met in regular session at Smitty's Ranch House on April 11, 1949. The meeting was called to order by the acting President, Dor Faber, with the following members present: Chuck Beck, Ralph Erickson, John Weisley, Ed Vincent, Joe Krupp, Bert Smith, Ben Cheney and Bill Askwith. Hoosier Hoffard, baseball manager, was also present.

Bert Smith made a report on the water pipe, stating that it should be here by the 15th or 20th of April and that it costs 42 to 45 cents per foot. The City Council had been asked before to pay for this but they were not very willing and didn't believe that the pipe could even be obtained. Don Faber stated that since the City Council had promised at one time to pay for the pipe, they should do it and not have the Central Point Athletic Association pay

for it. Bert Smith made the motion that someone go to the City Council and tell them that we have secured the pipe and ask them to pay for it. Ben Cheney seconded the motion and the motion carried. Bert Smith and Don Faber were to then contact City Council.

Bert Smith gave the treasurer's report for the game with Hilt on April 10, which is as follows:

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It was agreed that each boy returning a ball at the home games would be paid 10c.

It was also agreed that no one would be paid to operate the concession stand this year. The motion was made and seconded that Don Faber be in charge of the concession stand with each man taking his turn at operating it at the home games. Motion carried.

Don Faber read letter from the Southern Oregon Baseball League regarding meeting to be held in Grants Pass on April 15.

Hoosier Hoffard and Bill Askwith were appointed to see about securing umpire.

Joe Krupp made suggestion that we invite veterans at Camp White hospital to our games and give them free admission, providing this is all right with the League. Ben Cheney made motion that we follow this suggestion and Erickson seconded

the motion. Motion carried.

It was agreed that Bill Askwith would take Don Faber's place at meeting to draw up baseball schedule for the League in case that Don would not be able to attend.

It was stated by Don Faber that we should recommend to the League that no free passes should be given out except to the ball players and their wives and that an admission of 50c for adults and 25c for high school students with student body cards should be charged. All present were agreed upon this.

Ed Vincent, Joe Krupp, Chuck Bateman, Don Faber and Bill Askwith were expected to attend the Southern Oregon Baseball League Meeting in Grants Pass on April 15.

As there was no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

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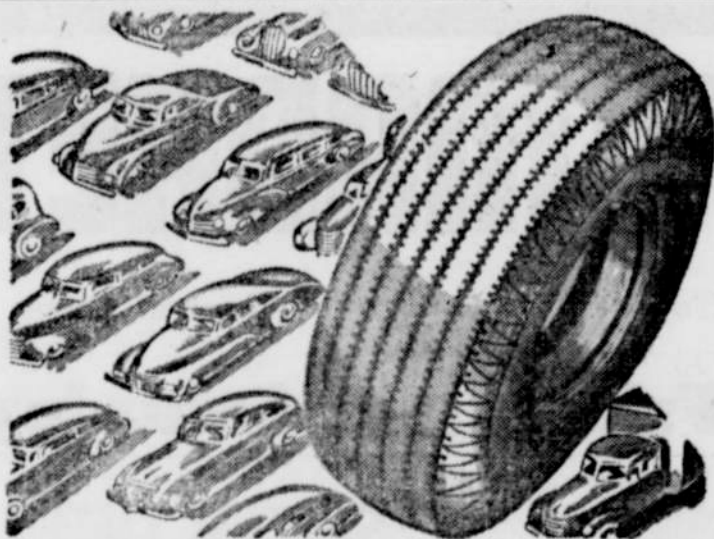
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
