

Lyle Seymour Is Appointed Resident Forester Tree Farm

In a recent issue of The Timberman magazine appears an article describing the planting of tree seeds by helicopter on some 400 acres of cut-over land of the Roaring River Logging Co.'s tree farm located in the hills east of Albany. The article, which was profusely illustrated, shows pictures of the operation and is of special interest to Central Point people as the pictures show a local young man, Lyle Seymour son of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Seymour who was recently appointed resident forester of the project.

It was not the first aerial seeding in Oregon nor even the first 'copter seeding, but it was the first by one of the smaller operators, and thus shattered some barriers in forestry thinking. The unusual job was set up by the Willamette Valley Tree Farms, Inc., cooperative forestry group of which Roaring River is a member. It was supervised by Assistant State Forester John S. Woods as one of the many state research projects made possible by Oregon's timber severance tax.

Roaring River's tract, one of the first certified West Coast Tree Farms, is a compact property, for the management of which Willamette Valley Tree Farms is responsible. Willamette Valley Tree Farms supervises all the many tree farm activities, of which fire protection is most important. It assigned Lyle Seymour, who recently graduated from OSC school of forestry, to Roaring River as resident forester. He is now making his home at the permanent tree farm headquarters at the forest entrance. He has just moved into a fine new

dwelling, office and equipment structure, with landscaped grounds which has just been completed.

Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Seymour returned Sunday to their home on Taylor road from visiting their son and his family in their new home.
