Equalization Board To Hold Meetings

The county board of equalization will meet Monday, May 9, in the county courthouse for the purpose of reviewing, examining and correcting the assessment rolls so that valuations of any property on the rolls can be increased or reduced.

The board will also hear requests from taxpayers asking for an adjustment of their assessments and will place any omitted property on the rolls.



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While the board is in session three weeks unless their work is completed sooner, all requests for an adjustment of assessments must be made the first week.

If the request of the taxpayer is not allowed by the board, he can appeal the decision to the circuit court and from there to the state supreme court.

The board is composed of the three members of the county court, the county clerk and the county assessor.

NO DAYLIGHT SAVING—

There will probably be no daylight saving time in Medford and

Jackson county this year, unless the entire state goes on "fast time," according to a recent statement by Medford officials. Under a new law, no city can declare daylight saving time unless the entire state goes on that time, and then only if the neighboring states also do so. There has been little or no demand for the change in this county.
