One hundred-word pins were awarded in shorthand to Charleen Cummins (100 words per minute for 5 minutes), and Earlene Blackwood (100 words per minute for 3 minutes); Evelyn Fogle and Donna Nealon received 80-word pins for 80 words per minute for 5 minutes. Pins also were awarded to Venice Moon and Donna Lester for perfect papers at 60 words per minute for 5 minutes.

All shorthand awards are based on 95% accuracy in transcribing. Laurel Jewett was awarded a 60-word typing pin. She has a rating of 63 words per minute for 5 minutes; Lucille Harnish, a 55-word pin; and Layne Denning with a rating of 54 words per minute, a 50 word pin.

A special award was made to Glenn Hedgpath for accuracy. This semester he has had a record of 55 timed writings with 5 or less errors.

Mrs. Lucille Schopfer accompanied the girls.

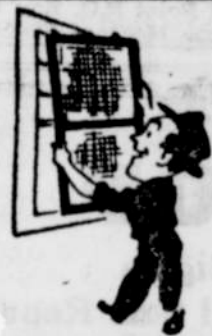
Bible School at Jacksonville Opens

Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Kolkemo and family of Medford visited with the Lloyd Hammonds Tuesday.



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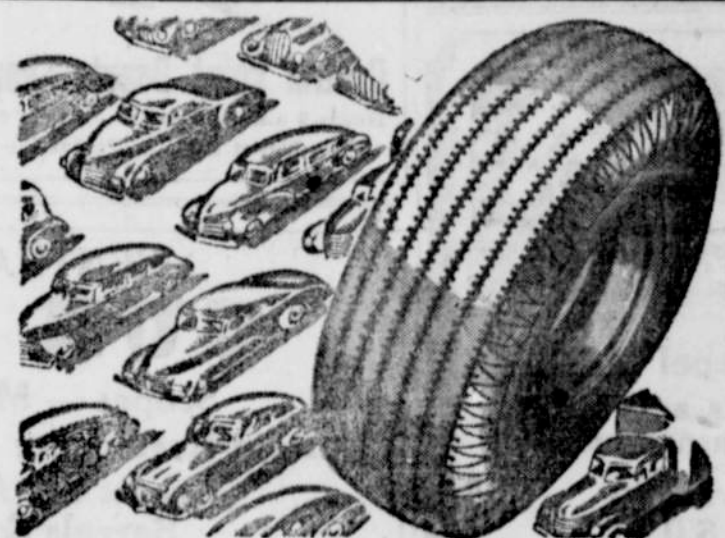
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
