Champion cookie baker was Marilyn Paull, who exhibited a plate of tasty drop cookies. Vicki Noel and Barbara Thomason received blue awards on their cookies, Joan von der Hellen and Gayle Childress received red, and Marla Jean Abbott Melba Jean Allen and Maxine Hawks received white awards.

Gail Skyrman's lovely Angel Food cake won for her the championship in this group of exhibits. Gail also received red awards both on her sewing project and in style review. Esther Snook and Margaret Troutman received red awards on their cakes and white awards on their sewing projects. Margaret also placed in the white group in style review. Other cakes placing in the white group were exhibited by Helen Tonn, Lois Parsons and Barbara Parsons.

Barbara went to the top in the cake baking contest, however, being judged champion and winning a trip to State Fair where she will enter the state cake baking contest. In the local cake baking contest Marilyn Bohnert placed second and Lois Parsons third.

Local Bank Report Shows Bigger Business

In answer to the June 30 call of the comptroller of the currency, the Central Point branch of the First National Bank of Portland reports deposits of 756,035.54 and loans of \$307,673.54. In charge of the local bank is R. C. Isaacs, manager.

A year ago the figures were, deposits, \$529,457.21, and loans, 413,256.02, Isaacs said.

President F. N. Belgrano, Jr. stated that for the First National group of 61 banking offices, as a whole, the June 30 statement shows loans of 181,397,739.97, and deposits of \$554,856,546.94. A year ago, with 56 banking offices in the group, the figures were, deposits, \$572,979,049.71, and loans, \$163,875,390.13.

President Belgrano pointed out that the decrease in deposits since June 30, 1943 reflects the readjustment of business to a more normal level and the slackening of the post-war surge of consumer buying and are in line with a nation-wide trend.
