THE PLAN FOR SUPER-GOVERNMENT

Before the people are fully aware of the danger, a determined campaign is underway to place the entire United States under a series of "authorities" which would be beyond the control of the 150,000,000 American people.

At the moment, the Columbia Valley "Authority," redesignated "Administration," is the one which is holding the headlines, for the reason that a concerted effort is being made to jam it through a reluctant Congress this year.

These authorities, judging by TVA and the proposed CVA, would each be run by three men, all of whom would be appointed by the President, and none of whom would be elected by the voters.

If this seems an extreme statement, read the CVA bill which is now in the Congressional hopper. Under it, the three directors would be virtually beyond effective control even by Congress.
