Fellowship Clubs Aid Soap Collection

Westminster Fellowship clubs of the Jacksonville and Central Point Presbyterian churches are sponsoring a collection of soap, which will be sent to displaced persons in Europe through the Church World Service. The collection at this time was prompted by the Halloween season, according to a club spokesman who stated members felt soap should be conserved for the displaced European families rather than used for Halloween pranks. Collection boxes for the soap are being placed in the Jacksonville and Central Point Presbyterian churches and members of the churches and Sunday schools are asked to contribute this Sunday morning, October 29.

The spokesman also pointed out, according to information received from Church World Service because

of soap shortage, the displaced persons in Europe are allowed to use soap for personal cleanliness only about once a week, and for laundry purposes at much greater intervals.

The clubs will meet this Sunday in Central Point at 6:30 p.m., with the junior group meeting at the Presbyterian church parlors. Andrew Taylor will be junior leader.

During the fellowship hour following topic periods, members will play Halloween games, and refreshments will be served by Mr. and Mrs. Al Setness.

The members met in Jacksonville last Sunday evening. Mrs. Pete Pick, Mrs. Warren N. Hazen and Miss Eley Walker served refreshments of cider, homemade doughnuts and crumpets, at the close of the fellowship hour.
