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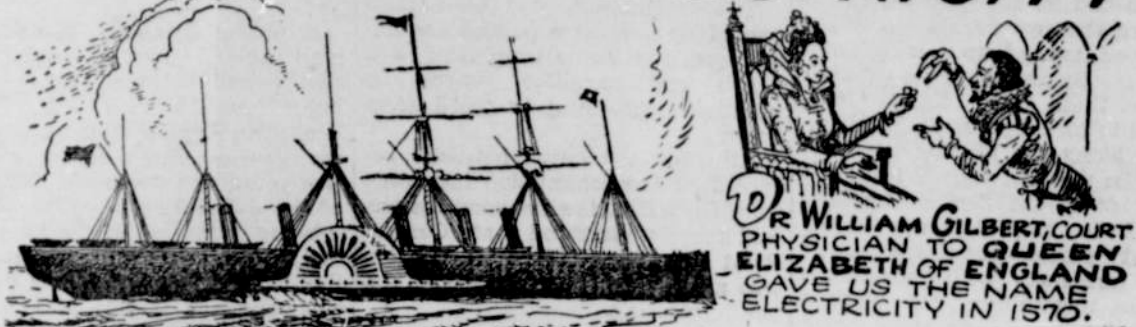

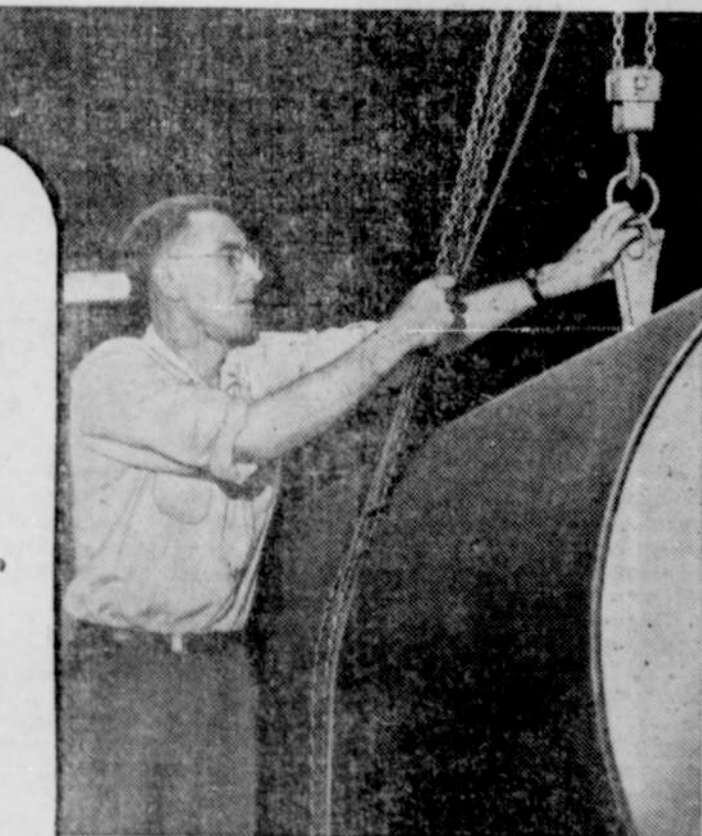

JENKS HATCHERY STILL GROWING

When Mr. and Mrs. Enoch M. Jenks (right) started a chicken hatchery in 1910 on the pioneer Jenks family ranch near Tangent, their kerosene incubators held 250 eggs. Today, with sons Marlowe (left) and Melvin in charge, the hatchery's automatic electric incubators take 213,000 eggs (12 tons) at a setting. There are 8600 chickens at the Tangent breeder ranch and 10,000 turkeys on 300 acres near Corvallis. Quality chicks and poults are shipped as far as Hawaii. The Jenks', First National customers at Albany, field men especially valuable in helping their business—and Oregon—grow.

SONS EXPAND MILLING BUSINESS

A flour milling business founded at Island City in 1896 by the late Edward E. Kiddle continues to grow with the Grande Ronde Valley it serves.
