Man to Travel

By Dog Team

Fairbanks to Maine

(Editor's note: Cecil A. Moore is mushing across the Arctic on the longest dog-sled trip ever attempted. He hopes to end his journey across the continent in his home town of Lewistown, Maine. He tells here of the reason for the trip and his hopes for success.)

To most persons a journey from Fairbanks, Alaska to Lewistown, Maine, a distance of 5000 miles, seems like quite a trek, even in the most modern of automobiles. Mr. Cecil Moore of Lewistown has embarked on such a journey but instead of motor transportation he is on his way with dog team.

The street in front of the Federal Building in Fairbanks was jammed with sightseers and camera fans when, at 1:00 p.m. Fairbanks time, November 14th, Moore called "Mush!" to his team of nine Husky dogs and his long jaunt was under way.

Sponsored by the Lion's Club of Lewistown, Moore is making the trip to raise funds to build a camp for under-privileged children.

When interviewed on the morning of November 18th at Mile 55 on the Richardson Highway east of Fairbanks by a special correspondent for the Central Point American, Moore explained the proposed camp plans more fully.

"The camp we intend to build will be for children from all parts of the country. The governors of each state will designate a number of children to attend each year, names to be furnished by welfare agencies throughout his state.

"If anyone in Southern Oregon wishes to assist in this work," Moore continued, "they may write to me in care of the postmaster at Whitehorse, Yukon Territory, Canada."

Moore is carrying a load of 700 pounds on his sled, which includes a large number of stamped envelopes which were canceled by the Fairbanks postoffice and which will be of interest to philatelists.

Mrs. Moore, the wife of the venturesome traveler, is waiting at her home at 15 Elm St., Lewistown, Me., for her husband to complete his cross country trip. He expects to take about four and a half months for the journey.

"I'm planning on taking it easy for the first two hundred miles," commented the traveler. "When both the dogs and I become more trail hardened I expect to make forty or fifty miles a day."

Shortly after leaving Fairbanks he was forced to change his sled over to wheels instead of runners as the winds had whipped most of the snow from the roads and the gravel made the sled too hard for the dogs to pull. Moore said he would probably leave the wheels on until reaching Whitehorse, Canada.

As soon as conditions are favorable for runners on the sled, the adventurer plans on leaving the highway and go cross country to Edmonton, Canada. Traveling by dog team is no novelty to Mr. Moore, who has had much previous experience both in Maine and in British Columbia, where he has hunted and fished a lot.

Questioned about traveling in the extremely low temperatures he is apt to encounter, (Snag, Y. T., near the border of Alaska and the Yukon Territory in Canada, often has the dubious honor of being the coldest spot on the continent, reaching 89° in November of 1947) Moore commented:

"Any time it falls below 25° I'll just pull off the road, build a big fire and curl up with the dogs. I don't want to take any chances of frosting their lungs."

With a grin Moore brushed aside a question about bears and wolves. "Bears will be hibernating now," he chuckled. "As to wolves, I've heard that lions can lick wolves and I'm a LION, you know."

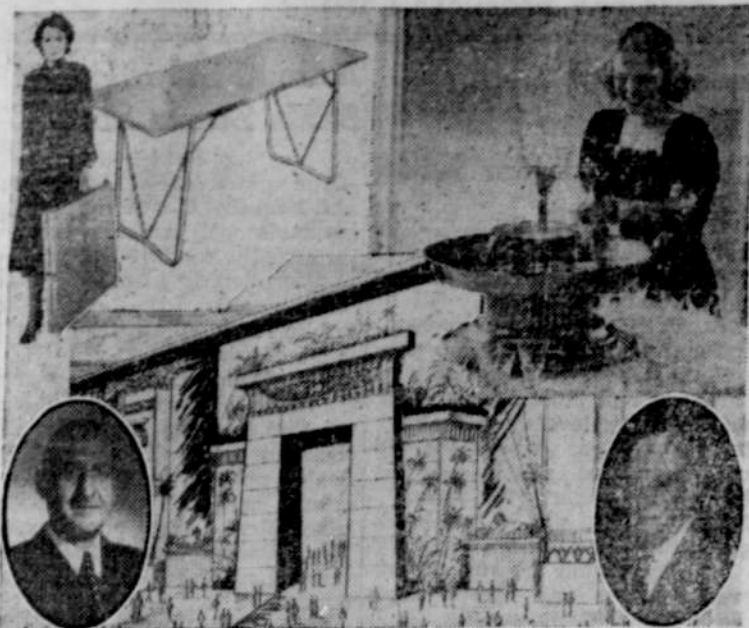

National Hotel Show To Have Numerous Ingenious Devices

Cooking meat and poultry in a few minutes by infra-red heat instead of requiring a couple of hours in the usual fashion; new systems for conditioning and purifying the air in rooms and corridors; modern lighting, safety and health-promoting ideas, are among the novel inventions and improvements to be exhibited at the 34th National Hotel Exposition. This huge display which attracts more than 125,000 visitors during its annual five days run will be staged from November 7 to 11 in Grand Central Palace, New York. It will be the largest yet held. More than 500 exhibitors will offer their products and services on the four spacious exhibition floors of the famous building — covering nearly four acres. Practically every sort of product adaptable to hotel use (which, of course, in many cases applies to clubs, transportation lines, schools, colleges and institutions) will be on display in a manner that affords easy comparison.

Frank A. Paget, chairman of the Exposition committee, and manager Arthur L. Lee, remark that recently much attention has been given by manufacturers and hotel owners to the matter of providing in-

creased comfort and homelike atmosphere for guests.

Considerable attention has been given by the industry to modernizing hotel operation itself. At the show there will be offered the latest in kitchen, dining room and bar equipment, making for speedier, more efficient labor-saving service. An interesting feature is a beverage fountain which will make its debut. This is "in action" with colored lights playing on it and affords a continuous serving of champagne, punches or cocktails. A \$10,000 dish washer model — a truly remarkable creation — and other less costly ones are to be exhibited. There will be an ingenious device to prevent annoying "table wobble." "Foldaway" tables with legs that fold up and can be carried like light luggage are a boon to those whose job is moving dining equipment from one location to another; the latest in fiber and plastic curtains (some hand-painted); also new nylon bathroom curtains; several styles of easily cleaned wall coverings; a new type of crystalware approximately twenty times as strong as ordinary crystal; Jade-ite heat-proof dishes, and many other recently manufactured products to reach the market will be shown.
