NEW COPCO PLANT NEARING COMPLETION

The Toketee power plant of The California Oregon Power Company's North Umpqua project will soon be ready for service, it was announced today. Toketee, first of eight new plants being built in the five year period ending 1953, will bring 40,500 additional kilowatts of power to the people in the company's service area through the Roseburg load center.

"Totalling 145,000 kilowatts in all, the North Umpqua project is larger

than the power company's pre-war generating capacity. Part of a \$50,000,000 post-war building program, which includes expansion of transmission lines and distribution facilities, the project is designed to meet the tremendous growth of this area and to keep pace with future demands for electric service," said Albert S. Cummins, Copco president, in making the announcement.

"It is planned that formal dedication of the new project will take place in Roseburg in the near future. Details of the dedication program will be announced when completed," Cummins stated.
