Physicians Are Told How to Secure Use Ambulance Plane

George Milligan, chairman of Mercy Flights, Inc., a non-profit corporation, Saturday sent to all Jackson county physicians information on how to obtain emergency air ambulance service for their patients. Directors of the corporation also have been provided with full information concerning the operation of the plane, and any of them will be able to assist doctors in getting the service.

The air ambulance project was started early in September, 1949, when a group of interested individuals decided that the need for such emergency air transportation should no longer go unfilled.

The corporation was formed with Milligan as acting chairman, and solicitation of a \$3,000 fund was begun. Response to the appeal was immediate, with a considerable portion of the total donations being from school children of the county. No school was unrepresented in the gifts, most of which were earned by the youngsters themselves.
