Central Point's semi-pro Studs opened the Southern Oregon Baseball League Sunday with a 24-0 win over the Rogue River club at Rogue River.

The Studs were red hot both at the plate and in the field, massing a total of 2 hits and not committing any misques in the field. The Stud pitchers, Gehrman and Mellbye only allowed four Rogue River players on the bases and only one of these reached second base. Gehrman allowed two hits in six innings and Mellbye none in three.

Left fielder, Norm Lucich was the big gun for Central Point with five hits in six times up, including a double and a triple. He batted in five runs. Mellbye hit four for five and drove in three counters. George Gitzen, first base, hit three for four and scored for runs. Howard McDonald tripled in two runs in the first inning.

The Rogue River nine looked very poor in every department of the game and certainly will be no credit to the Southern Oregon League unless they start strengthening their line-up. They showed lack of leadership and no incentive to cooperate as a team. It is hoped they will improve their team roster before it is too late.
