Speaker Says Increase In Population Too Fast

Oregon State College—People in this state should not fret when census figures fail to come up to inflated ideas, believes L. B. MacNaughton, president of the First National bank of Portland. He says that for most of the time since the early 1900s, people have come to Oregon faster than they could be properly absorbed.

MacNaughton expressed his opinions in an address before the second annual Institute of Northwest Resources held in connection with the summer school. About 80 percent

of Oregon's resources come from the farms and the forests, and these industries can absorb just so many people, he pointed out.

He advocated more industries to turn Oregon's raw products into finished form. The state produces great wealth but too much of it is being shipped in box cars in the raw state, he declared.
