Studs To Face Banks At Silverton Friday

The Cheney Studs of Central Point will make their first bid in history for a state semi-pro baseball title when they travel to Silverton Friday with a well-balanced squad to face defending champion Banks in a 9 p.m. opening round encounter.

The Studs, sponsored by Cheney Oregon Lumber company will have the services of three players in addition to their regular squad. They are Al Brightman, former Cleveland Indian first baseman, who will also see outfield service; Al Ivanich, a fast ball chucker; and Bob Hedington, ex-Portland Beaver, and outfielder and third baseman.

Brightman had a brilliant pro career before giving it up to coach. A Portland report established the Studs on paper as the strongest team of the tourney because of eight players with pro experience and because several on the roster have been outstanding college players.

Both hitting and pitch power will be provided in the Stud's line-up. Pitching is considered a deciding factor in tourneys. In addition to Ivanich, the Central Pointers will have Paul Gehrman, ex-American and Coast league, and Clarence Mellbye, ex-Linfield college ace, to share mound chores.

Paul (Hoosier) Hoffard, long-time Southern Oregon league star and manager, is pilot of the Studs. He is a dangerous pinch hitter. Hoffard will be gunning for his second state crown. Eagle Point copped the diadem when he managed there in 1930.
