STUDS PLAY TWO GAMES SATURDAY & SUNDAY

The Central Point Studs will play two important games this week end at the Medford fairgrounds ball park. Saturday night at 7:45 p.m. the Studs meet the third place Ashland Lithians and Sunday afternoon at 2:00 p.m. they meet the up and coming Crescent City Merchants.
 The Saturday night game with Ashland pits the strong Central Point Studs against the hardest hitting club in the Southern Oregon League. Ashland is leading the league in hits, having garnered 127 hits and 103 runs in ten games. They have hammered all the opposing pitchers they have faced so far this season. In an earlier game played at Ashland, the Lithians garnered twelve safeties off the Studs star pitcher, Paul Gehrman, but the Studs were able to squeeze out a victory. Probably starting pitcher for Ashland this Saturday night will be big Tex Gatlin, who has won his last four starts including a victory over the strong Roseburg nine.

Manager Hoosier Hoffard's choice for starting duties on the mound will be big Paul Gehrman with Frank Roelandt handling the catching duties. The Studs lineup will be made up of the following players: George Gitzel, 1st base, former Washington State College player and veteran of the Southern Oregon League; Don Fawcett, 2nd base, Oregon State College infielder; Dint Cox, shortstop; Alex McDonald, 3rd base, former professional ball player and present Medford High School baseball coach, utility infielder Fred Stammen. In the outfield: Moose Blevins, Southern Oregon College outfielder; Norm Lucich, former professional ball player; Clarence Mellbye, former professional ball player and present Central Point High School baseball coach. Moose Blevins, Alex McDonald, Norm Lucich and Paul Gehrman are all star choices at the Oregon State baseball tournament this year where the Stud team took fourth place in this tournament.

At the present time the Studs are in first place in the Southern Oregon League and the Ashland team is in third place and a win for either club in this game will strengthen their position in the league standings.

The Central Point Studs meet the Crescent City Merchants this Sunday at the Medford fairgrounds ball park at 2:00 p.m.

league standings. They are lead by a former Rogue Valley ball player and Southern Oregon star, Chuck DeAutrement. Other members of the Crescent City nine are players from Humboldt State College and Chico State College. They have a very fast and aggressive team and are at present leading the Southern Oregon League in fielding with a percentage of .967. Their starting pitcher will be Don Clauson and McComb will handle the catching duties.

The Studs probable starting pitcher will be Clarence Mellbye, former Linfield College star and professional pitcher and now the present Central Point High School baseball coach. The Studs are currently leading the Southern Oregon League with nine wins and one loss. Game time will be 2:00 P.M. at the Medford Fair Grounds baseball park, home of the Medford Rogues.

STUDS LOSE TO ROSEBURG

In a hard fought game right down to the last inning, the Central Point Studs dropped a close game to the Roseburg Chiefs 1-0 last Sunday at Roseburg. The score was 0-0 right up until the last half of the ninth inning when Roseburg squeezed in one run with a double error by the Central Point infield, allowing the first hitter of the inning to reach second base. Paul Gehrman, on the mound for the Studs, put out the next two batters in a row but the next batter singled, to the left field, driving in the only run of the game.

On the mound for Roseburg was Buzz Sporer, former Salem Senator pitcher, allowing only five scattered hits to the Studs and Big Paul Gehrman limited the Roseburg nine to five scattered hits. The loss left the Studs with a one game lead over the Roseburg Chiefs in the Southern Oregon League.

On August 27th the Studs will play the Roseburg Chiefs on the Central Point diamond in the final league game of the season which will probably be a determining factor in deciding the league championship.
