Sportsmen's Club Hears Talk by Robert U. Mace

Wednesday evening some 50 sportsmen heard Robert U. Mace, chief biologist in charge of big game of the Oregon State Game Commission, speak on the big game outlook in Oregon this year and tell of this year's hunting regulations. Mr. Mace discussed with the group, the various types of large game, their habitat and the problems arising in various parts of the state in regards to the herds' mortality, forage and harvesting by hunters. The control of predators has greatly increased the deer supply and various species of large game such as Rocky Mountain Elk have been introduced into Oregon.

Through the information on game population and available feed received from sportsmen, landowners, field workers of the Game Commission sets up the hunting seasons. This year the deer season will open on September 30 and continue through October 17, not only because of fire hazard, but also because of damage to both crops in agricultural areas and winter ranges by problem animals. Mr. Mace stressed that permission must be secured from ranchers before hunting on their property; in return, assistance in location of deer might be secured.

This year, the Game Commission is setting a "Hunter's Choice"—two day season on October 21 to 22 when a person possessing an unused deer tag may take one deer (either buck, doe or fawn) in many areas of Oregon to decrease the deer population which has been damaging crops in search of food.

Mr. Mace, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Mace, Kirtland Road, Central Point, was accompanied by Dave Luman of Grants Pass, local district agent of upland game.

John Wisely, president of the Central Point Sportsmen's Club, appointed a committee to work out a schedule for shoots to be held in the future.

ENROLLMENT AT LOCAL SCHOOL SHATTERS RECORD

One of the largest single elementary school units in Oregon is right here in Central Point. This week there were 757 students enrolled in the Central Point grade school. The figures for the individual grades are as follows: Grade I—103 in four rooms, Grade II—115 in four rooms, Grade III—112 in four rooms, Grade IV—85 in two rooms, Grade V—79 in two rooms, Grade VI—97 in three rooms, Grade VII—75 in two rooms, and Grade VIII—71 in two rooms. The large number in the third grade made necessary the holding of classes by Mrs. Ruby Downing at the Community Bible Church and by Mrs. Florence Pinkham at the Church of Christ. Also, the big enrollment in the sixth grade required the moving of a section of that grade taught by Mrs. Schuman, to the grade school gym.

The election returns for the officers of the grade school student body are as follows: Gail Skyrman, president; Vern Parent, vice president; Nancy Eitemiller, secretary; James Higinbotham, boys' athletic manager; Pat Snook, girls' athletic manager and Margaret Trautman, trophy custodian. This council will serve for the fall semester, and will meet soon and draw up a new constitution.

Over at the high school in Central Point will be found an additional 231 students, making a grand total of 988 boys and girls to be found most of the time every school day between 3rd and 4th streets on Bush street.

Each noon so far, in the school cafeteria, Mrs. Hewitt and Mrs. Yocum have served around 400 lunches.

The teachers all appreciated the effort on the part of the P.T.A. to decorate the entire school system with bouquets of flowers last Thursday. This work added a touch of color and pleasure to every room.

Attending the Jackson County Council of Parents and Teachers Wednesday were Mrs. Arnold Bohnert, local P.T.A. president, Mrs. C. B. Cordy, vice president, Mrs. Leslie Bigham, county secretary and Mrs. C. W. Anhorn, county bulletin chairman. During the business meeting in the morning at the Y.M.C.A., workshops were conducted for unit officers.

Announcement was made by Mrs. F. L. Ragsdale, of the series of radio programs beginning on October 9th on KMED at 4:30 p.m. with a panel discussion on "P.T.A." The following Monday, October 16 will begin the first in a series of 14 programs, sponsored by the Medford City P.T.A. council and the Jackson County Health association, "The Inquiring Parent" by Dr. Luther F. Woodward.

In the afternoon, Mr. Marble Cook, director of Field Service for Oregon Education association, led a discussion on the Basic School Fund Increase, called the Children's Bill. This bill to be voted on in November will increase the basic school support from \$50 to \$80 per child in the state of Oregon. The campaign—Vote 306X Yes is being backed by many groups, among them is the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers and the Oregon Education Association.

Join The P.T.A.
