C.P. Spartans Bounce Medford 19-6
 Central Point Junior High's seventh and eighth grade bounced Medford's seventh and eighth grade 19-6 on the Medford Junior High field, Saturday, September 30th at 10:00 a.m.

Central Point had to come from behind as Medford scored its only touchdown on the first scrimmage play of the game. Lloyd Cennley passed about 30 yards to Dennis Miller who went the rest of the distance. From then on it was Central Point's game.

Central Point received the kickoff on the 50 yard line and then marched 45 yards on three plays, placing the ball to Medford's five yard line. Hill then plunged through center for a touchdown, tying the score, 6-6.

Central Point kicked off to Medford but after four downs Central Point took over. During the march to Medford's goal line the first quarter ended. After a brief time out Central Point's march continued with a 40 yard end run by Bagley to Medford's three yard line. Harris plunged through the center for Central Point's second touchdown.

Central Point kicked off to Medford who carried the ball to Central Point's 30 yard line before losing the ball on downs. Central Point kept the ball until the first half ended. Central Point scored again in the third quarter. Harris on a spinner through center for the extra point to make the score 19-6. Medford never crossed Central Point's 25 yard line thereafter.

Coach Al Gaspee praised the spirit and drive shown by his players and cited the following boys for

their offensive play: Higinbotham, end; Peterson, tackle; McCann, guard; Taylor, center; Glenn, guard; Yocom, tackle; Cochran, end. For defensive play Gaspee nominated Parent, end; Welch, guard; Lilly, fullback; Harsh, quarterback.

This was the second victory of the season for the Central Point Spartans against no defeats. Last week the Spartans won easily over the Eagle Point eighth graders, 28-6. The Spartans have five remaining games on their schedule:
