Shoes That Hurt Feet Affect Women's Looks

No woman can look charming if her feet are hurting, observes Miss Murle Scales, Oregon State college extension clothing and textiles specialist.

The woman wearing shoes that hurt her feet walks in painful jerks and has a preoccupied expression on her face that is as pinched as her feet.

Durability is second in importance to comfort. Calfskin is a suitable leather for shoes which must give service. Kid is easily scuffed as the leather is thin and soft. It is used for dress shoes, as are suede and crepe. Patent leather and plastic are serviceable but uncomfortable for some persons as they are non-porous.

Reptile and alligator shoes are appropriately worn with tailored and street costumes but not dressy clothes. Alligator shoes are suitable for a large woman while reptile shoes are a better choice for a small person. Ankle straps make the ankle look larger and the woman shorter and stouter. Every extra detail on shoes attracts attention to the feet.
