Economic Highlights

To put it mildly, the political strategists of both parties are in a state of confusion and wonder as to what changes, if any, the November elections will produce. Republican and Democratic party spokesmen have gone through the routine of saying that they expect whopping victories at the polls. Neither side, it is safe to say, is anywhere as confident as those standard-brand prognostications would indicate.

The primaries have not demonstrated much of anything. Both Truman and anti-Truman candidates have won. The New Hampshire primary was watched with the greatest interest, where pro-Truman Senator Tobey ran against an anti-Truman war veteran. Senator Tobey made the grade, but by a very scant margin. In the Maine election, the GOP candidates, as usual won in a walk. Elsewhere results were indecisive.

The Democratic position will be much the same as it was last time. It will be argued that the President is the friend of the masses of the people and the enemy of exploiters, and that his program is just what the country needs. It will be necessary to elect a strongly Democratic Congress, the argument will continue, to give him the support he must have. The Taft-Hartley law will undoubtedly take a verbal beating, as a bid is made for the important labor vote. The Brannan plan will get its full share of praise, as an inducement to the farmer to stay on the Democratic side of the ticket.

The dismissal of Secretary Johnson, a bare two weeks after the

President said that he would keep that official on for the duration of his Administration, is a straw in the wind. Public and Congressional opinion had flared up against Mr. Johnson to the point where, the political high command decided, he was an impossible liability to the party. General Marshall, with his vast prestige and splendid record, was from that point of view a perfect choice.

That the Republicans have plenty of ammunition goes without saying. The vast change for the better in the Korean situation does not detract from the fact that we were utterly unprepared for a war there. The right-about-face that the Administration has made in Asiatic policy provides the GOP with a potent weapon. Great criticism will be made of the Administration's demand that private citizens retrench when it continues domestic spending at an increasing rate while piling on top of it an unpredictable number of billions—\$30,000,000,000 for the next fiscal year alone—for military purposes. The basic Republican argument will be that the Democrats have at last proven themselves utterly incapable of guiding this country through the period of strain and grave danger that lies ahead. The Republican leaders feel that there is evidence that this belief has grown in the grass-roots. Whether it has grown to a sufficient extent to change the control of Congress is what no one knows. And that is what will make the coming elections unusually interesting as well as vitally important.

Medicine on The Hoof

When a doctor looks at a meat animal, what does he think about? In company with the layman, he probably thinks that the animal will one day be converted into some mighty fine steaks, chops, roasts and other cuts.

On top of that, it is likely that the doctor looks on the animal as a highly important "assistant" in the practice of his profession.

The reason for this is that meat animals, and meat animals alone, are the source of more than 50 vital drugs and medicines. These include insulin, thyroid, liver extract and hormones. Other drugs of meat animal origin which are now in the experimental stage promise medical miracles. So far they are scarce, and research has not developed to the point where they are ready for general use. But the indications are that they will either cure or alleviate a number of serious afflictions, such as arthritis, which has long presented grave problems to the medical fraternity.

To provide these medicines, millions of tiny glands from meat animals must be carefully saved and accumulated. The packing industry has taken that job upon itself, and it's no small order. As an example, to make one single ounce of insulin, the pancreas glands of 1500 cattle or 7500 pigs are needed. But the job is always done.

So the meat animal is more than a handsome collection of good
