POINTERS WIN—

The Central Point High opened their home schedule Friday night by winning over Sutherlin 6-0. This was the Pointers first conference win against no defeats.

The game opened by Sutherlin kicking out of bounds on the Central Point 40 yard line. On three running plays the Pointers were unable to make a first down and punted to Sutherlin's 25 yard line. Sutherlin made two first downs and moved the ball to the Pointers 48 yard line. Bob King, Pointer fullback, recovered a Sutherlin fumble on the next play, then Chuck Walker on a beautiful off tackle run made 28 yards but Sutherlin held and the Pointers lost the ball. Sutherlin lost the ball as the first quarter ended with neither team threatening to score.

The second quarter was hard fought by both teams. Neither club was able to penetrate past the other's 25 yard line. As the first half ended Sutherlin had a slight advantage in yardage and first downs but the Pointers were just getting the feel of their opponents.

The second half started with the Pointers kicking off to Sutherlin. On the first play, Bill Bates, Pointer right end, threw Sutherlin for an 8 yard loss. Sutherlin could get no place and kicked to Central Point's 31 yard stripe. Herb Trautman made 15 yards around right end and then drove seven yards off tackle. On the next play Sutherlin recovered a Pointer fumble but the Pointers took over when Walker recovered a Sutherlin blocked kick on the Sutherlin 32 yard line. Then the Pointers powered their way to the Sutherlin 25 yard line, but lost the ball on downs. Sutherlin worked the ball up field into Pointer territory but the Pointers defense stiffened and the third quarter ended.

In the early part of the fourth quarter the ball changed hands several times with both teams opening up with their passing attacks. Carrigan on a quarterback sneak drove to the Sutherlin 18. Then with less than a minute left, Carrigan passed to Chuck Walker on the ten and Walker raced the rest of the way for the score. Try for point failed. The game ended with Sutherlin throwing two passes about midfield.

Outstanding players for the Pointers on the line were Spence, McCoy, Kluspies and Bill Bates. In the backfield Carrigan, Walker, Trautman and King were outstanding. First downs for Central Point 6; for Sutherlin, 5.

Then on three fast running plays the Eagle Pointers went over for the first score of the game. In attempting to run the ball for the extra point they failed to make it.

The Spartans controlled the ball most of the time in the rest of the first quarter but failed to score. They lost little time in the second quarter in registering their first score and then ran the ball over for the extra point. The score was then 7-6 for the Spartans.

In the third quarter the Spartans put on a ground offensive that pushed the Eagles back in their own territory. With Hill, Parent, and Tonn ripping at the line, the Spartans went over for the second score but failed to get the extra point. The score moved up to 13-6 for Central Point.

In the final quarter the Spartans opened another drive good for 55 yards and scored easily with Guyer going over for the final Central Point score. The extra point failed after two offside, score 19-6.

At this point Eagle Point put on a drive of their own, coming from their own 40 yard line with beautiful blocking and a pass play good for 15 yards, they scored six points as the game ended shortly after that with a final score of 19-12 for the Spartans.

The standout players for Central Point were Hill, Parent, Tonn, and Harsh in the backfield. On the line Hoag, Murphy and Higginbotham.

The Spartans looked nifty in their football uniforms which they wore for the first time this year. The boys were really proud of the uniforms which was shown by their sparkling game played.

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GERMAN STUDENT
ENJOYS AMERICA

"I came to America to learn agriculture and to find out how democracy works," stated Roman Kluspies, of Germany, in an interview recently with the editor.

"The Grange has brought me from Germany to America for one year to learn better farming methods and democracy so that I can tell others at home and teach them," he replied when asked why he had come to America and what he intends to do.

Roman Kluspies came across the Atlantic, then traveled four days and four nights across the U. S. to southern Oregon. He traveled with four other German boys who came to America for the same purpose and are scattered through the Pacific states.

He came from a section of country called Middle Franken, and lived near the city Wurzburg. Of interest is the fact that Germany proper is smaller than Oregon and this section where Roman is from is about the same size as Jackson county.

Roman comes from a family of seven including his grandparents, father and mother and two sisters. He went to elementary schools for six years, but his schooling was interrupted from 1943-1945 by the war.

When asked if the German people hate the Americans he replied "No!" He said that during the war while the Americans were dropping bombs there was some hatred but after the war, when we began to

send food to Germany and to help them get established that hatred was swept away.

Roman stated that he likes America "very much" and wants to come back again sometime. But for now he's glad he's in the U.S. so we say "Welcome, Roman, to America and C.P.H.S."
