**Part and Full Time Jobs for Teen-Age Boys Needed Badly**

Part and full time jobs for teenage boys receiving service from the County Juvenile Department are needed. Frank Sawacki, County Juvenile Officer, reported. Boys in various parts of the country, including farm, city and village areas, could make use of after school, week-end and full-time work experiences. Sawacki stated that he welcomes the interest of farmers, businessmen and home-owners in making jobs available for boys. He requested that interested individuals write to him at the Court House in Medford, or phone him at 2-5877, indicating the kinds of jobs they would have available now or in the future.

Sawacki explained that jobs sometimes can be vital factors in affecting the rehabilitation of some juveniles under his supervision. In addition to such youth actually desiring and needing jobs to meet their school and other living expenses, more significantly, jobs can have important psychological value to a particular boy in developing his self-confidence and his sense of social worth. Sawacki pointed out that youth being served by him at times need to be helped in making contacts with prospective employers, thus aiding the boy and the employer to be mutually benefited.

The Juvenile Officer stressed that he hoped to bring prospective boy workers and employers together on the basis of a job serving to meet the particular needs of the two parties concerned. For those reasons, Sawacki added, it may not be possible to immediately bring together the right boy for the right job and employer. Location of boys, distance, transportation and other factors also pose problems. But every effort will be made by his department to bring employers and

boys together. He asked that interested employers get in touch with him, and every effort would be made to make use of what they had to offer as soon as possible.

**Washington O. Bailey Passes Away Nov. 28**

Notice is hereby given, that on Tuesday, the 7th day of November, 1950, at the General Election held on that day in the South Gold Hill Precinct No. 79, in Jackson County, Oregon, the Measure to determine whether or not a livestock district should be created, to be known and designated as South Gold Hill Livestock District, for the purpose of prohibiting livestock from running at large in that portion of the South Gold Hill Precinct, described as follows:

All of those portions of Sections 16, 17, 19, 20, and 21, Township 36 South, Range 3 West of the Willamette Meridian in Jackson County, Oregon, which portions of said Sections lie south of the southerly shoreline of the Rogue River, and that portion of the West one-half of Section 22, Township 36 South, Range 3 West of the Willamette Meridian in Jackson County, Oregon, south of the southerly shore-line of the Ro-

gue River, was voted upon. A majority vote was cast for the formation of the livestock district, and all persons are hereby notified that it shall be unlawful for stock to run at large in that portion of the South Gold Hill Precinct described above, after the sixtieth day from the date of the first publication of this notice,

under penalty of imprisonment in the county jail not more than one year, or by fine not more than \$500.00, or by both such fine and imprisonment.
