Great Lakes, Illinois—Dennis W. Smith, airman, USN, of Route 1, Central Point, Oregon, recently returned to the U.S. from the Far East aboard the aircraft carrier USS Philippine Sea.

Since her arrival in the Far East last August the Philippine Sea has steamed more than 121,500 nautical miles, approximately five times the distance around the world. Her air groups have flown more than 10,000 combat sorties and are credited with the first MIG-15 shot down by a Navy pilot.

While operating against the enemy a record total of 7,872 tons of high explosives was dropped in one operating period in support of UN ground forces.
