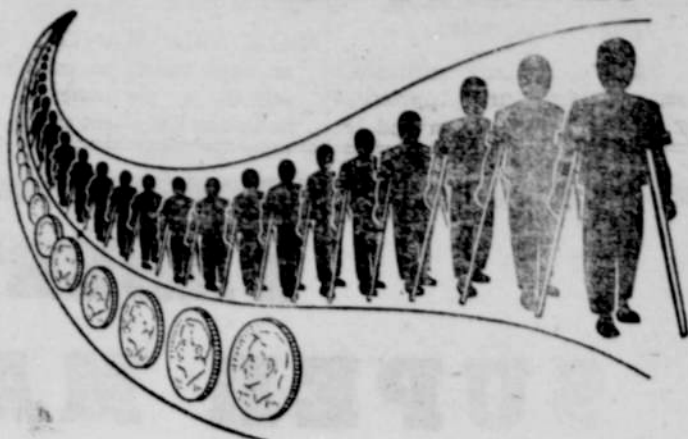

The March of Polio is OUT-PACING

THE MARCH OF DIMES



March of Dimes incurred \$5,000,000 debt aiding 67,800 Polio patients in 1951. This included 45,000 cases carried over from previous years.

Despite yearly increases in March of Dimes receipts, the rising tide of polio has forced the National Foundation into debt each of the last four years. The debt in 1951 was approximately \$5,000,000. The financial crisis faced by the March of Dimes has been brought about not only by increased incidence but also by increased costs and increased numbers of carry-over cases requiring aid long after they have been stricken. The March of Dimes aided 45,000 such cases last year, in addition to the four out of five new patients needing aid in 1951.

Crater Hopes For 'Big' Drive

Marching in step with several Jackson County high schools and supporting the bandwagon of the campaigns for the 1952 March of Dimes, Crater High has organized its drive for the Polio fund.

March of Dimes Month (January 2-31) will see thousands of activities proposed to support the National Foundation's goal to completely wipe out the universal threat to humanity, infantile paralysis.

Foremost in Crater High's campaign is the election of the King of Dimes. From each class a candidate has been selected and are listed as follows: Freshmen—Vern Parent; Sophomore, Herb Weber; Junior, Del Tucker; and Senior, Charles Lindgren. The number of 1c votes purchased by the student body will determine the victory. Twenty votes or 20c will purchase a ticket to the Amateur show to be presented next week.

The show for which a cast has been chosen, featuring participants from each class, will present a prophecy of the future as seen by the staff of Crater Comments. Also, included will be entertainment by several of Crater's amateurs. All proceeds will be forwarded to the March of Dimes.
