X-Ray Unit To Be at Crater High January 22

During their drive to X-ray every person over 15 years of age in Jackson County, the traveling X-ray unit will be at Crater High School on January 22, Tuesday.

It is hoped that 100% of Crater High's students and teachers will have an x-ray while the unit is here.

Taking an X-ray is very simple. All you do is give your name and address, remove your coat or jacket and step up to the machine. There is no undressing. There is no charge for the x-ray. The x-ray will not only show tuberculosis but will show other diseases of the chest.

Taking an x-ray is a good way of stopping illness before it happens. Within two weeks you will receive a report of your x-ray. If you are O.K. that's something off your mind. If you have contracted t.b. you will have caught it before it becomes too serious. Last year 19 cases were found in Jackson County.

To prevent t.b., keep in good health. Eat a balanced diet, get enough exercise, and enough rest and sleep. If you're healthy, you are safer from tuberculosis than if you let yourself get too tired and run down. Get a chest x-ray and a physical check-up by your doctor every year. It is better to be safe than sorry. Get your x-ray when the unit is here!
