Pay Your Debts in 1952

This is the year to pay off old debts and avoid new ones, according to an economic outlook pamphlet recently prepared by Miss Mary Beth Minden, extension home management specialist at Oregon State college.

Farm incomes are still high but families are already feeling the effect of rising taxes and costs. Paying debts later may be difficult, she warns.

Copies of "What's Ahead for the Oregon Farm Family in 1952," HE 5-506, may be obtained at county extension office.

The year will start with good supplies of most consumer goods, she predicts, but defense needs may reduce supplies later in the year. Severe shortages are not likely, however. Food is expected to be plentiful during 1952 with prices remaining steady or moving slightly higher.

In general, she says, families can learn to live with the present inflation if they produce more, buy only what they need, save as much money as possible, and discourage unnecessary spending, both personal and public.
