Walter D. Nunley To Run for Dist. Attorney

Walter D. Nunley, young Medford attorney, filed his declaration of candidacy today with Earl T. Newbry, the Secretary of State, announcing his intention to seek the Republican nomination for the office of District attorney.

Nunley is a native of Huntington, West Virginia, and received his early education in the public schools and Marshall College in that city. He served in the Army Air Forces from 1941 through 1945. He is a member of the American Legion and the V.F.W. and is presently president of the Medford Toastmasters.

After his discharge from the service, Nunley studied forestry and law at Montana State University under the G.I. Bill and was graduated in law in 1949. He is a member of the Montana Bar and is admitted to practice in that state. In September,

1950, he was admitted to practice in Oregon and moved to Medford.

Nunley, who is 33, resides at 423 Park street, Medford, with his wife and son and, until recently, has been associated in the practice of law with the firm of Roberts, Kellington and Branchfield. He now has his office in the Goldy Building.
