LEAVE US ALONE WEEK

The Commerce Department reported recently there were only twenty-four days left in the year which were not designated days. All the weeks and months have been taken and, in many cases, taken twice. The Department suggested that the days not designated for any sort of national observance be called "un-days."

There are so many commemorations and designations of days and weeks this year that nobody will be left alone. The Department's calendar listed 147 weeks and twenty-two months as special commemorative weeks or months in 1952. Since there are only fifty-two weeks and twelve months in the year, the overlapping is extensive.

The editor suggests, in addition to the twenty-four "un-days" left, that be a sort of armistice in which several weeks and several months each year will be left as "un-weeks" and "un-months." There might even be a national "Leave Us Alone Month," though it is doubtful if anyone would leave us alone.

STOPPING POLIO

About seven months ago nearly four hundred persons, who represent the entire population of the little town of Frost, each took five shots. This is an experiment to determine whether rabies shots will prevent infantile paralysis. At the present time there have been no polio cases reported since the shots were given. Of course, the big test

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comes in August and September, which are bad polio months in Frost.

The experiment is the brain child of Dr. Herbert Hippy, of Waco. The success of the experiment is a result of the untiring efforts of Dr. Will Miller, who alone inoculated two hundred persons and who paid a substantial part of the expense of the experiment. Dr. Hippy explains that his theory is based on the similarity of rabies and polio, both of which he believes are virus infections which attack the nervous system.

Notice hereby is given that at the school district bond election hereby called to be held at the following polling places within said school district to-wit: at the school building in the city of Gold Hill and at the Junior High School located at 4th and Bush Streets in Central Point, Oregon, in and for School District No. 6 of Jackson County, Oregon, the 5th day of April, A.D. 1952, between the hours of 2 o'clock p.m. and 8 o'clock p.m., there will be submitted to the legal voters thereof the question of contracting a bonded indebtedness in the sum of \$195,000.00 for the purpose of providing funds with which to construct an addition to the Junior High School building located at 4th and Bush Streets in Central Point, Oregon, within said school district, for classroom purposes and to equip and furnish the same, and to construct an addition to the High School building located on Pacific Highway No. 99 in the City of Central Point, Oregon, within said school district for classroom purposes and to equip and furnish the same, and to construct a building at said high school for school shop purposes and to equip and furnish the same in and for said school district.

The vote to be by ballot upon which shall be the words "Bonds Yes" and "Bonds No" and the voter shall place a cross (x) between the word "Bonds" and the word "Yes," or between the word "Bonds" and the word "No," whichever indicates his choice.

The polls for the reception of the ballots cast for or against the contraction of said indebtedness will, on said day and date and at the places aforesaid, be opened at the hour of 2 o'clock p.m., and remain open until the hour of 8 o'clock p.m., of the same day, at which hour the same will be closed.

Notice hereby is further given that the district school board of said school district, for the purposes of aforesaid bond election has divided said school district into two election precincts, one of which consists of all that part of said school district lying and being within election precincts numbered 78 (Gold Hill North), 79 (Gold Hill South), 80 (Footh Creek) and 76 (Rogue River) as established by order of the County Court of Jackson County, Oregon as election precincts for general elections and all legal school voters of said school district residing within said general election precincts shall vote at said election at the school building in the City of Gold Hill; the other of said election precincts of said school district consists of all that part of said school district lying and being within election precincts numbered 69 (Central Point West), 70 (Central Point Northeast), 71 (Central Point
