Students Approve Constitution April 14

"We, the students of Crater High School in order to establish a more perfect and democratic student body and to promote the general welfare of the individual student, do ordain and establish this constitution of the Associated Student Body of Crater High School." These are the words to the preamble of the constitution that was voted in April 14 as the ruling institution of Crater High.

Every student should have read the constitution but just in case you found it too heavy to plow through Crater Comments would like to present a short resume.

Of course you all know who the officers of the student body are and you should also know that the vice-president of each class will be on the student council which is the ruling council of the school.

The Legislative council is com-

posed of the executive council and presidents of all functioning organizations of the school. Paper and Annual editors and Yell king or queen are included.

Student body and class officers have to keep their grades up because the constitution calls for a grade average of 2.5 during the previous year.

An interesting part of the constitution is under the Letterman Club section where the enforcement of the laws of Crater High are put under direct control of the lettermen.

The constitution has been set up to try and keep students from having too many offices. Students are now eligible for only one major office and one minor office or two minor offices or one club or organization president. Major offices are listed as student body executive council officers, class presidents, paper editors, and annual editors.

Constitution Passes—

Monday, April 14, was the first general voting of Crater High School. This voting was for the adoption of the Constitution of Crater High. Only students were allowed to vote; no faculty members were permitted to vote. The total number of students voting was 262 with the result being 141 in favor and 121 against.

The constitution for Crater High will go into effect next fall. The next general election will be held on May 2 at which time the student body officers will be elected.

Crater Takes 7th Place At Hayward Relay

April 18, at Eugene Oregon, the Hayward Relays were held for B and C divisions and for A divisions on April 19. In the B division Cottage Grove placed first with 42½ points; Ashland fourth with 23 points; and Crater seventh with 17 points. In the C division Pleasant Hill placed first with 47 points. Medford won the A division with a high of 63½ points and Grants High of Portland taking second place with 59 points.

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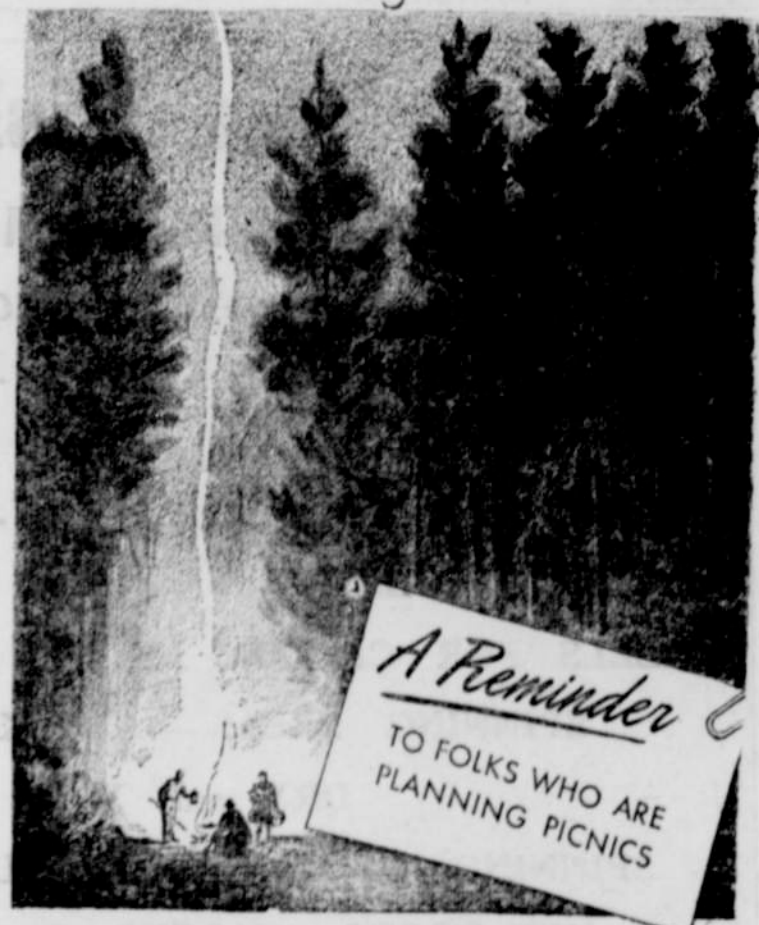
